WHEREAS: Congressman Joseph Kennedy, in cooperation with the Anti-defamation League, recently took a trip to Germany to decry the resurgence of nazism in Germany and to request the German government to take a strong stand against the rising tide of anti-foreigner and anti-semitic sentiment; and

WHEREAS: The resurgence of sentiments similar to those which led to the slaughter of millions of people in Europe a half a century ago is a frightening specter to many -- sentiments which we have found distributed in newspaper form only recently here in Cambridge; and

WHEREAS: The events before and during World War II showed how important it is to speak out loudly and clearly in response to fascism in order to prevent its spread and the impression of quiet approval; and

WHEREAS: Both then and now courageous people have taken a stand and attempted to help those under attack; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council hereby commends the work of our Congressman, Representative Joseph Kennedy, in his visit to Germany to ask the German government to quell the spread of resurgent nazi sentiment and joins him in that request; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council supports the efforts of all people, as well as organizations such as the Anti-Defamation League, to speak out and work against such sentiment in our own city as well as elsewhere; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to send a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to Congressman Kennedy, The Anti-Defamation League, and the German embassy.
