The NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT SUB-Committee

The sub-committee and the commission discussed the following areas of mutual concern:

DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION

They discussed the reissuing of the pamphlet "NO PLACE TO HIDE" and the addition of communities that have followed the City of Cambridge. The Commission established a peace library section in the Central Square Library.

EDUCATION IN CAMBRIDGE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Commission stated that there was a summer workshop program that had the participation of eight elementary teachers. That annotated bibliographies had been prepared for the students in kindergarten through grade twelve and have been given to the principals and the libraries and will be given to the teachers. The Commission stated that they needed duplicating assistance from the School Department. They also stressed the need for parent involvement.

ECONOMIC CONVERSION

The Commission stated that a research project was done on the military economy of Cambridge and on present dependence on military dollars and findings would be made public on June 21, 1984.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE

The Commission stated that there was a workshop at the Montessori School which had parents and teachers parenting on the nuclear age and that they hoped for the same workshop at the Social Action, St. Paul's A.M.E. The Commission further stated that a forum on Haitian and Central American refugees was held.

SISTER CITY

The Commission stated that in the fall they would like to raise money for Sister Cities and that they would like to send a delgation to the Soviet Union.

FUNDRAISING

The Commission stated that it was having difficulty in obtaining grant funds because the funding agencies expected the cities to fund these programs and requested suggestions as to find a way to raise money to help finance these programs and projects as stated above.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Commission discussed miscellaneous ways in which to educate the citizenry on the destruction of nuclear warfare.

The Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education stated that they required additional help from the City Council as follows:

- Duplicating the pamphlet "NO PLACE TO HIDE".
- Requested an ordinance which would require companies with a certain percentage of military contracts to set up alternative use committees.
- They suggested the City Council to establish a "Hiroshima Day" in Cambridge as a means of educating the citizenry concerning war and the long-term effects of radiation.
- Establishing exchanges of a substantive nature with the Sister Cities of Portugal and Italy

Establishment of a mechanism of raising funds for these proposals.

Establishment of "Disarmament Weeks", internal education of the City Council and help from City Council in the form of resolutions.

The Committee referred this report to the City Council for their consideration at the City Council meeting held on June 4, 1984.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Two entitled "Administration" is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof a new Article XXXIX entitled "Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education", which reads as follows:
Article XXXIX. Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education Establishment.

There shall be a Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education.

Function and Purpose.

It shall be the function of the Commission to:

- (a) Support the actions taken by the Cambridge City Council to protect the citizens of Cambridge and lessen the danger of nuclear destruction to the City of Cambridge;
- (b) Work to implement the November 4, 1981 mandate of Cambridge voters to "contact the Massachusetts Congressional Delegation to place a freeze on the further development of nuclear weapons in the City of Cambridge;"
- (c) Work with the City government and its departments, educational institutions, private and public agencies, and other interested organizations toward bilateral nuclear disarmament and a peaceful world, through public dissemination of relevant information and through educational outreach to the schools and citizens of Cambridge.

Powers and Duties.

The powers and duties of the Commission shall include the following:

- (a) To design and disseminate material, and establish a resource library for disarmament education, including a speakers bureau, and to assist citizens in the use of this material.
- (b) To assist the Cambridge Public Schools and the parochial and private schools in Cambridge in developing nuclear disarmament curricula on:
 - (1) the causes of war
 - (2) technology in the nuclear age
 - (3) the history of disarmament
 - (4) conflict resolution.

(c) To support and assist teachers initiating such nuclear disarmament curriculum.

(d) To hold, and assist in the conduct of, educational and advocacy meetings or hearings on nuclear disarmament by public agencies, organizations, institutions or private persons in the City of Cambridge. This shall include an effort to reach out to those most affected by the diversion of funds from the City of Cambridge: organized labor, the poor, the unemployed, minorities and women.

(e) To initiate public exhibits and events in City Hall, city libraries, public schools and in other locations within the City, consistent with the stated purposes of this ordinance.

(f) To cooperate with public agencies and private groups in other cities and towns of the Commonwealth in programs for disarmament education.

(g) To promote mutual understanding with people in other nations consistent with the purposes of this ordinance, such as the City Council's proposal for a "twin" city in the USSR, and the receptions held by the City of Cambridge for peace visitors from Europe and Japan.

(h) To develop and recommend policy regarding the prevention of nuclear destruction to the City of Cambridge and the safety of Cambridge citizens to all departments, divisions, and agencies of the City, including the City Manager and the City Council.

(i) To advance the enactment of legislation which promotes nuclear disarmament at city, state, and federal levels, and to monitor the implementation of such legislation.

(j) To assist the Civil Defense Department of Cambridge in its duties, consistent with the purposes of this ordinance.

(k) To determine the extent of nuclear weapons-related industry within the City, and to study advocate and assist in the conversion of such industries to non-nuclear weapon-related activities, including the retraining of workers employed in those nuclear-related industries.

(l) To make public statements and act on matters related to nuclear disarmament.

(m) To raise funds for the use of the Commission and to accept money, gifts, and services for its exclusive use and expend or use the same, and subject to appropriation or to receipt of such money, gifts, and services, employ clerical and technical assistants or consultants; and to be consulted by and make recommendations to the City Manager with regard to the employment of the Executive Director.

Membership, Appointment, Term, Removal

(a) The Commission shall consist of twenty members, all of whom shall be appointed initially by the City Manager to serve for the following terms:

- (1) six members shall serve for a one year term;
- (2) seven members shall serve for a two year term;
- (3) seven members shall serve for a three year term.

After the initial terms all Commissioners shall be appointed for a term of three years.

(b) If any Commissioner misses three unexcused meetings of the Commission during a calendar year, that position of said Commissioner shall be automatically vacated upon certification to the City Manager by the Commission.

(c) After the initial appointments, subsequent members of the Commission shall be appointed by the City Manager from recommendations provided by the Commission. The Commission shall consult with recognized groups working for nuclear disarmament to obtain names of qualified candidates. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs; and if a vacancy occurs prior to the expiration of the member's term, an appointment shall be made for the remainder of the term.

(d) The Commission shall be representative of the socio-economic and racial/ethnic populations of the City.

Election of Chairperson; By-laws.
 The members of the Commission shall elect a Chairperson from among its members, and shall adopt by-laws for the Commission.

Qualifications of Commissioners

(a) All prospective Commissioners shall believe in and support the goal of nuclear disarmament as embodied in the resolutions passed by the Cambridge City Council.

(b) Commissioners must be residents of the City of Cambridge at the time of appointment.

Membership, Appointment, Term, Removal

The Commission shall consult with recognized groups working for nuclear disarmament to obtain names of qualified candidates. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs; and if a vacancy occurs prior to the expiration of the member's term, an appointment shall be made for the remainder of the term.

(d) The Commission shall be representative of the socio-economic and racial/ethnic populations of the City.

Election of Chairperson; By-laws.

The members of the Commission shall elect a Chairperson from among its members, and shall adopt by-laws for the Commission.

Qualifications of Commissioners

(a) All prospective Commissioners shall believe in and support the goal of nuclear disarmament as embodied in the resolutions passed by the Cambridge City Council.

(b) Commissioners must be residents of the City of Cambridge at the time of appointment.

(k) To determine the extent of nuclear weapons-related industry within the City, and to study advocate and assist in the conversion of such industries to non-nuclear weapon-related activities, including the retraining of workers employed in those nuclear-related industries.

(l) To make public statements and act on matters related to nuclear disarmament.

(m) To raise funds for the use of the Commission and to accept money, gifts, and services for its exclusive use and expend or use the same, and subject to appropriation or to receipt of such money, gifts, and services, employ clerical and technical assistants or consultants; and to be consulted by and make recommendations to the City Manager with regard to the employment of the Executive Director.

Membership, Appointment, Term, Removal

(a) The Commission shall consist of twenty members, all of whom shall be appointed initially by the City Manager to serve for the following terms:

(1) six members shall serve for a one year term;

(2) seven members shall serve for a two year term;

(3) seven members shall serve for a three year term.

After the initial terms all Commissioners shall be appointed for a term of three years.

(b) If any Commissioner misses three unexcused meetings of the Commission during a calendar year, that position of said Commissioner shall be automatically vacated upon certification to the City Manager by the Commission.

(c) After the initial appointments, subsequent members of the Commission shall be appointed by the City Manager from recommendations provided by the Commission. The Commission shall consult with recognized groups working for nuclear disarmament to obtain names of qualified candidates. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs; and if a vacancy occurs prior to the expiration of the member's term, an appointment shall be made for the remainder of the term.

(d) The Commission shall be representative of the socio-economic and racial/ethnic populations of the City.

Election of Chairperson; By-laws.
 The members of the Commission shall elect a Chairperson from among its members, and shall adopt by-laws for the Commission.

Qualifications of Commissioners

(a) All prospective Commissioners shall believe in and support the goal of nuclear disarmament as embodied in the resolutions passed by the Cambridge City Council.

(b) Commissioners must be residents of the City of Cambridge at the time of appointment.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Two entitled "Administration" is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof a new Article XXXIX entitled "Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education", which reads as follows:
Article XXXIX. Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education Establishment.

There shall be a Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education.

Function and Purpose.

It shall be the function of the Commission to:

(a) Support the actions taken by the Cambridge City Council to protect the citizens of Cambridge and lessen the danger of nuclear destruction to the City of Cambridge;

(b) Work to implement the November 4, 1981 mandate of Cambridge voters to "contact the Massachusetts Congressional Delegation to place a freeze on the further development of nuclear weapons in the City of Cambridge;"

(c) Work with the City government and its departments, educational institutions, private and public agencies, and other interested organizations toward bilateral nuclear disarmament and a peaceful world, through public dissemination of relevant information and through educational outreach to the schools and citizens of Cambridge.

Powers and Duties.

The powers and duties of the Commission shall include the following:

(a) To design and disseminate material, and establish a resource library for disarmament education, including a speakers bureau, and to assist citizens in the use of this material.

(b) To assist the Cambridge Public Schools and the parochial and private schools in Cambridge in developing nuclear disarmament curricula on:

- (1) the causes of war
- (2) technology in the nuclear age
- (3) the history of disarmament
- (4) conflict resolution.

(c) To support and assist teachers initiating such nuclear disarmament curriculum.

(d) To hold, and assist in the conduct of, educational and advocacy meetings or hearings on nuclear disarmament by public agencies, organizations, institutions or private persons in the City of Cambridge. This shall include an effort to reach out to those most affected by the diversion of funds from the City of Cambridge: organized labor, the poor, the unemployed, minorities and women.

(e) To initiate public exhibits and events in City Hall, city libraries, public schools and in other locations within the City, consistent with the stated purposes of this ordinance.

(f) To cooperate with public agencies and private groups in other cities and towns of the Commonwealth in programs for disarmament education.

(g) To promote mutual understanding with people in other nations consistent with the purposes of this ordinance, such as the City Council's proposal for a "twin" city in the USSR, and the receptions held by the City of Cambridge for peace visitors from Europe and Japan.

(h) To develop and recommend policy regarding the prevention of nuclear destruction to the City of Cambridge and the safety of Cambridge citizens to all departments, divisions, and agencies of the City, including the City Manager and the City Council.

(i) To advance the enactment of legislation which promotes nuclear disarmament at city, state, and federal levels, and to monitor the implementation of such legislation.

(j) To assist the Civil Defense Department of Cambridge in its duties, consistent with the purposes of this ordinance.

(k) To determine the extent of nuclear weapons-related industry within the City, and to study advocate and assist in the conversion of such industries to non-nuclear weapon-related activities, including the retraining of workers employed in those nuclear-related industries.

(l) To make public statements and act on matters related to nuclear disarmament.

(m) To raise funds for the use of the Commission and to accept money, gifts, and services for its exclusive use and expend or use the same, and subject to appropriation or to receipt of such money, gifts, and services, employ clerical and technical assistants or consultants; and to be consulted by and make recommendations to the City Manager with regard to the employment of the Executive Director.

(b) Commissioners must be residents of the City of Cambridge at the time of appointment.

EDUCATION IN CAMBRIDGE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Commission stated that there was a summer workshop program that had the participation of eight elementary teachers. That annotated bibliographies had been prepared for the students in kindergarten through grade twelve and have been given to the principals and the libraries and will be given to the teachers. The Commission stated that they needed duplicating assistance from the School Department. They also stressed the need for parent involvement.

ECONOMIC CONVERSION

The Commission stated that a research project was done on the military economy of Cambridge and on present dependence on military dollars and findings would be made public on June 21, 1984.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE

The Commission stated that there was a workshop at the Montessori School which had parents and teachers parenting on the nuclear age and that they hoped for the same workshop at the Social Action, St. Paul's A.M.E. The Commission further stated that a forum on Haitian and Central American refugees was held.

SISTER CITY

The Commission stated that in the fall they would like to raise money for Sister Cities and that they would like to send a delgation to the Soviet Union.

FUNDRAISING

The Commission stated that it was having difficulty in obtaining grant funds because the funding agencies expected the cities to fund these programs and requested suggestions as to find a way to raise money to help finance these programs and projects as stated above.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Commission discussed miscellaneous ways in which to educate the citizenry on the destruction of nuclear warfare.

The Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education stated that they required additional help from the City Council as follows:


- Duplicating the pamphlet "NO PLACE TO HIDE".
- Requested an ordinance which would require companies with a certain percentage of military contracts to set up alternative use committees.
- They suggested the City Council to establish a "Hiroshima Day" in Cambridge as a means of educating the citizenry concerning war and the long-term effects of radiation.
- Establishing exchanges of a substantive nature with the Sister Cities of Portugal and Italy

Establishment of a mechanism of raising funds for these proposals.

Establishment of "Disarmament Weeks", internal education of the City Council and help from City Council in the form of resolutions.

The Committee referred this report to the City Council for their consideration at the City Council meeting held on June 4, 1984.
