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LATE ORDER

MAYOR GALLUCCIO

WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge continually looks to establish partnerships between local businesses, institutions and the Cambridge public schools; and

WHEREAS: The City of Cambridge has had ongoing discussions with Harvard University to develop an educational partnership between the University and Cambridge public schools; and

WHEREAS: The Cambridge public schools recently made a request for roughly \$1.5 million for the Cambridge-Harvard Summer Academy; and

WHEREAS: In response to this request, Harvard has allocated \$100,000, some of which will go to a Harvard employee to be hired to run the program; and

WHEREAS: Last week, Harvard announced a \$5 million commitment to an after-school initiative in Boston; and

WHEREAS: Although the City Council supports and congratulates the residents of Boston, the Council goes on record expressing its extreme disappointment that Harvard has proposed providing far fewer resources in response to Cambridge's requests for support around public education; and

WHEREAS: Cambridge currently struggles to expand and improve numerous important and productive school based programs in the city such as technical education, school based extended day learning programs and neighborhood learning centers as well as its city-wide literacy initiatives to name just a few; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council goes on record notifying Harvard of the Council's extreme disappointment in Harvard for not making a public commitment to equitable funding to Cambridge public schools and convey to Harvard the Council's serious concern about the long-term impact on the Cambridge-Harvard relationship; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the City Council ask all Cambridge residents affiliated with Harvard to respond with "a call to action" that Harvard make a similar commitment to the Cambridge public schools.

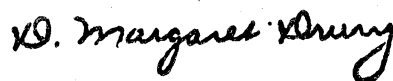
