WHEREAS: Joseph T. O'Callahan, Lt. Commander, U.S.N.R., received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his valor during the Battle of Okinawa where he served on the Air Craft Carrier, U.S.S. Franklin C.V13 where 432 men were killed and 1000 wounded, and

WHEREAS: In his book, Victory in the Pacific, author Samuel Eliot Morison says of Father O'Callahan, "there would have been 300 more men killed but for the heroic work of Lt. Commander Joseph T. O'Callahan U.S.N.R., the ship's chaplain who not only administered last rites, but organized and directed fire-fighting parties, and led two sailors below to wet down a five inch magazine that threatened to explode."and

WHEREAS: Father O'Callahan, was the only Navy Chaplain to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor and was a resident of Leonard Avenue, and

WHEREAS: Father O'Callahan's picture, which hung in the War Memorial Building, and was stored in the basement of the building during the high school renovation, was recently found, water soaked and damaged beyond repair, and

WHEREAS: A replica of the picture is being done through the generosity of one of our Cambridge residents,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the City Manager direct the Director of Veterans Services to arrange a suitable ceremony to re-hang the picture of Father O'Callahan in its proper place at the War Memorial so his bravery and valor will not be forgotten by future generations of Cambridge residents.
