WHEREAS: This City Council was deeply saddened at learning of the death of Lawrence L. "Reverend Larry Love" Hinkson on October 6, 2001; and

WHEREAS: Lawrence Lloyd Hinkson was born to Charles and Jeswene Hinkson on July 5, 1926 in Cambridge, Massachusetts; and

WHEREAS: The "Rev," as Lawrence was known to his friends, graduated from Cambridge High and Latin and the Berkley School of Music; and

WHEREAS: As a pianist and songwriter, Lawrence was especially proud of "Star of Love," a song he wrote that was later recorded by vocalist Roy Hamilton in the 1950's; and

WHEREAS: The "Rev" was a veteran of World War II having served in the United States Army; and

WHEREAS: In later years, the "Rev" was a familiar sight to the residents of Cambridge as he made his way around the city on roller skates wearing one of his many military outfits. He was a tourist's delight posing for photos while in Harvard Square or at his favorite haunt, the 1369 Coffee House in Central Square. His image can also be seen on outdoor murals on Massachusetts Avenue and Brookline Street in Central Square; and

WHEREAS: Lawrence's passing will leave a void in the lives of all his surviving family, his children Linda Scales-Ardolino, Terri Nelson, Lawrence L. Hickson, Jeswene Smith, Nickolh Moody, Joye Thomas, April Bakit, and Michael and Angel Hinkson; his siblings Vivian Breedy, Cynthia Spooner, Leona Bernice Weems and Thaishim Hammond; his grandchildren; and his nieces and nephews; and

WHEREAS: Lawrence will be sorely missed by all he touched and loved; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That this City Council go on record extending its deepest sympathy to the family of Lawrence L. Hinkson at this time of such personal loss; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to forward a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to the Hinkson family on behalf of the entire City Council.

The Lovenotes, who hail from Roxbury, Massachusetts, are without a doubt one of the finest RHYTHM & BLUES vocal groups to come out of the 1950's (not to be confused with the Lovenotes on Premium, Holiday or Wilshire records). These 3 groups, who also sang in the DOO-WOP style, hailed from NEW YORK and came a few years later. Like many other groups before them, they started singing together on street corners as teenagers. The original members, who started singing in the KENDALL Street Housing Project in Roxbury in early 1952 were BOB WHITE - tenor and lead, WALTER TAYLOR - tenor, JOHN DAVIS - second tenor and bass, BUDDY HOLT - baritone and second lead, and WALLACE ROSE - baritone. They cut their teeth performing songs of the day by THE ORIOLES and THE RAVENS and as well as pop and modern harmony arrangements done by the FOUR FRESHMEN, in front of an audience of appreciative neighbours. Soon they would be singing at local talent contests, High Schools and record hops with local DJ's as SYMPHONY SID and DAVE MAYNARD and gained quite a reputation for themselves locally.

In late 1952 BUDDY HOLT was replaced by ED ANDERSON, who sang bass and WALTER TAYLOR was replaced by TEDDY SANTOS, who also sang tenor. Both also hailed from the neighbourhood. In early 1953 CECIL STEIN, who later started PILGRIM RECORDS and first recorded and made famous THE G-CLEFS of "KA DING DONG", "CAUSE YOU'RE MINE"-fame, who also hailed from Boston, became their manager and took them into the studio in Boston. At two sessions they recorded covers of THE CRICKETS "YOU'RE MINE" - THE CLOVERS "TING A LING" and "CRAWLIN", AMOS MILBURN'S "LET ME GO HOME WHISKY". WALLACE ROSE did a cover of JOHNNY ACE's "I CROSS MY HEART" and ED ANDERSON along with CLARENCE JOHNSON did a cover of "MY KIND OF WOMAN". These tracks along with other covers by RONALD GILL - who wrote "SURRENDER YOUR HEART" for the group -, MARGIE ANDERSON, NAOMI LEWIS, PAUL ROBINSON, and the NATS WALKER ORCHESTRA were issued in early 1953 on budget EP's on the FAMILY LIBRARY OF RECORDED MUSIC and TIVOLI labels (see label photos by courtesy of VICTOR PEARLIN.)

CLARENCE JOHNSON was the guitarist for the DEAN EARL TRIO, who were the backing band for many of the tracks done at their first sessions. Next a young local songwriter and piano -



player, known as SIR LAWRENCE HINKSON, could approach them. About singing some songs he had written and would work his way into the group as pianist and doubled as the group's driver-road manager for a while, using his father's car for their road trips.

In 1953 and 1954 HINKSON brought the group into RADAX STUDIOS in Belmont, Mas. On a number of occasions, where they recorded his originals "BABY STOP YOU'RE CRYING", "STAR OF LOVE", "IT'S SO GOOD", and "GET OFF MY TRAIN" along with the standard "THE NEARNESS OF YOU" and RONNIE GILL's "SURRENDER YOUR HEART". Today RONNIE GILL is a jazz d.j. on WMBR radio in Boston. Again with the help of CECIL STEIN, two tracks were leased to LEW CHUDD for his IMPERIAL label: "SURRENDER YOUR HEART" backed with "GET OFF MY TRAIN". They were issued as IMPERIAL 5254 in 1953. While the record sold quite well in the Boston, New York and Philadelphia areas, well enough for the group to perform regularly at ROCK'N ROLL shows and showcase clubs in NEW ENGLAND, it failed to get the group a contract with IMPERIAL RECORDS. The group was also hired at that time to back up JAN STRICKLAND on "LOVE ME BAY" and "WHEN PETER WALKED ON WATER", which was issued as by JAN STRICKLAND and THE SHADOWS on HUB RECORDS in 1954. The group's next releases would appear on the legendary RIVIERA label: "I'M SORRY" backed with "SWEET LULU" and "SINCE I FELL FOR YOU" backed with "DON'T BE NO FOOL" in 1954. "I'M SORRY/SWEET LULU" was a strong seller and was also issued on the "RAINBOW" label in 1954 as well. (The RIVIERA versions command the higher prices).

The group like so many before them was sadly torn apart, when WALLACE ROSE and BOB WHITE were drafted.

This CD allows one of the truly unique chance to go back to those golden days of DOO-WOP - music and transports us to those UNIQUE LOVENOTES recording sessions from 1953 - 1954, including FIVE "5" previously unissued priceless performances by the legendary original LOVENOTES.

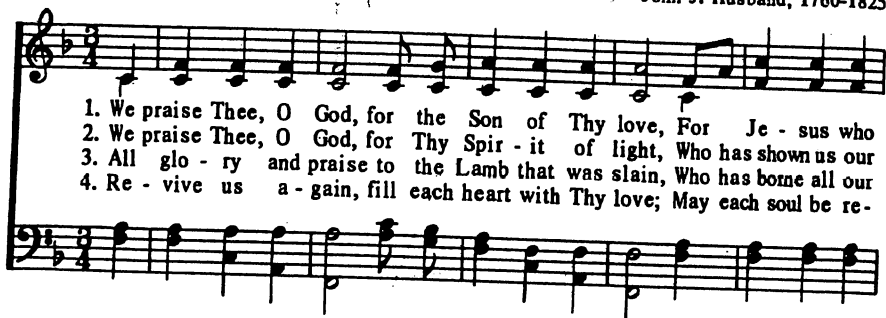

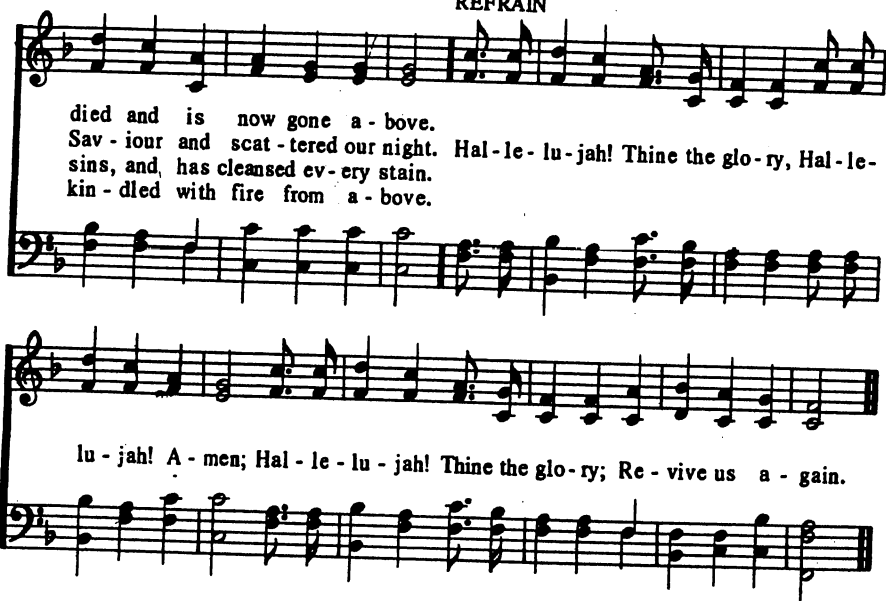
