Richard Franklin Reed

Former teacher, choir director, 68

Richard Franklin Reed of Cape Elizabeth, Maine, a former high school teacher and church organist, died of cancer Feb. 16 at the Yarmouth, Maine, home of his longtime friends Roger and Marian Wilmot. He was 68.

Mr. Reed was born in Boston and was a longtime resident of Melrose, where he attended school. He was a graduate of Christian High School in Lexington and received his undergraduate degree and a master's degree in education from Eastern Nazarene College. He also studied at Trinity College in Dublin, concentrating on Irish poetry.

He served as a chaplain's assistant in the Army from 1956 to 1958 while stationed in Germany.

Mr. Reed was an English teacher at Stoneham High School for 26 years until retiring in 1987. He was the adviser to Stoneham High's yearbook and made many contributions to the school magazine "Seeds." Also, he was the musical adviser for the yearly Carnival Ball Talent Show.

As a teenager, Mr. Reed played the organ and piano at the historic Park Street Church in Boston. Later, he was music director at the Presbyterian Church in Whitinsville. He then worked for Malden Centre United Methodist Church, where he directed the senior and junior choirs, which at one time had more than 70 members and recorded an album, "Centre Church Choir Sings Advent to Pentecost."

Mr. Reed was also director of music at Reading Congregational Church and gave free voice lessons to anyone in his choirs.

Mr. Reed directed many choral groups: the Wollaston Men's Chorus, the Timberlane New Hampshire Chorus, Whidden Memorial Nurses Chorus, and the Gorham, Maine Chorus. He was the artistic and musical director of the folk group Intimations of Immortality, which performed in New England in the late '60s and early '70s. He was also a member of the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston and the Portland Choral Society.

Mr. Reed had lived in Carver and Newburyport before retiring to Cape Elizabeth, where he was a staff member at the YMCA and

Philip Aranow, 52; psychologist, headed psychotherapy institute

Philip T. Aranow of Cambridge, a psychologist and president of the Institute for Meditation and Psychotherapy, died Feb. 18 in a car accident in Naples, Fla., at 52.

State Police said he was killed when a pickup truck driven by a 15-year-old boy crossed over into his lane, causing a head-on collision.

Born in New York City, Mr. Aranow grew up in Hastings-on-Hudson, N.Y. He attended Phillips Academy in Andover and Harvard College. He was active in the student protest movement at Harvard in the late 1960s.

After graduation, he spent two years teaching in Kampala, Uganda, with Volunteer Teachers for Africa. He returned to Cambridge and helped set up a state development bank. He also served as chairman of the Industrial Cooperative Association.

In 1978, he returned to Harvard to study psychology, and later, while working as a psychologist, received his doctorate in 1988.

Mr. Aranow had a private practice in Cambridge and Lexington, and was on the faculty of the Massachusetts Schools of Professional Psychology. He also taught at Wellesley College and Harvard Medical School.

He was a student of Buddhist meditation for 25 years and wrote

and lectured extensively on Buddhist concepts and their application in psychotherapy. He was a long-standing participant in a study group of psychotherapists interested in meditation.

In 1994, members of his group founded the Institute for Meditation and Psychotherapy in Cambridge to provide instruction to mental health professionals.

He leaves his wife, Deborah Hulihan; two sons, Matthew and Henry; and two brothers, Robert Aranow of Dedham and Peter J. of Hastings-on-Hudson. A memorial service will be held at a later date.

Music Review

Apple's show has bite

Fiona Apple represents the flip side of the bubblegum pop of Britney Spears and the other formulaic

Music Review MTV creations. Apple sings about

the nonfluffy side of reality — about relationships gone bad, about the attendant scars, and about trying to dig out and move on.

Apple survived a troubled youth, moving on to sell 13 million copies of her debut album, "Tidal," three years ago. She was only 19 at the time. Three years later, she's back with a new album, "When the Pawn..." which hasn't done as well (No. 127 on this week's Billboard charts), but marks an artistic progression for her. Such progress was once what music was all about, until the accountants took over at record labels and decided that it was only measured in sales.

Apple is lucky, though. She had her blockbuster album early — and now she can work on her craft. That was clear at Friday night's show before a sold-out crowd of 2,800 at the Orpheum. Apple didn't need to rely on trumped-up, dance-production numbers to make her point. She merely sang her heart out and that was enough to confirm that she's going to be a career artist always worth watching, while bubblegummers fade away.

What was striking was her newfound confidence. When Apple first played the Orpheum in 1998 (opening for Chris Isaak), she stammered around and talked in a nervous, speed-rapping tone. She ad-
