- WHEREAS: In 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture, that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees; and
- WHEREAS: This holiday, called Arbor Day, was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska, and, is now observed throughout the nation and the world; and
- WHEREAS: Trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce oxygen and provide habitat for wildlife; and
- WHEREAS: Trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires and countless other wood products; and
- WHEREAS: Trees in our city increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community; and
- WHEREAS: Trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal; and
- WHEREAS: Cambridge is actively seeking recognition as a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation, and desires to follow its tree-planting ways; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That I, Alfred E. Vellucci, Mayor of the City of Cambridge, do hereby proclaim April 28, 1990 as **ARBOR DAY**, in the City of Cambridge, and urge all citizens to support efforts to protect our trees and woodlands and to support our city's urban forestry program; and be it further
- RESOLVED: I urge all citizens to plant trees to gladden the hearts and promote the well-being of present and future generations.
