WHEREAS: Henry served his country in World War II in the Navy; he was stationed in the Aleutian Islands; and

WHEREAS: After his military service, Henry began his career with the United States Postal Service; he started at the South Postal Annex, and then was transferred to the Union Square Post Office in Somerville, where he worked for 30 years; and

WHEREAS: In 1955 Henry married Mary Hooker, a second-generation Cantabrigian, and moved into the family home at 51 Fayette street, where he lived the rest of his life; and

WHEREAS: Henry and Mary were blessed with four children, Susan, Nancy, Jean and Thomas; and, in turn, with eight grandchildren, Kim, Mike, Erin, Kristen, Robin, Kevin, Matthew and Michael; and

WHEREAS: To Henry, family always came first; and his community activities came as a natural extension of his loving support for his children; he was an enthusiastic volunteer with the Cub Scout troop at the Longfellow School and continued as a Cub master long after his son Tommy left scouting; he volunteered as a school tutor throughout his children's years in elementary and high school; and he was a skilled and patient Little League baseball coach in the Central Division; and

WHEREAS: Henry and Mary were also active members of St. Mary's Church; and

WHEREAS: Henry passed away on July 13, 1981; and

WHEREAS: Henry was an invaluable member of the Cambridge community; his enthusiasm, patience, love and generosity will not be forgotten; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council declares that a tree shall be planted in front of 62 Fayette Street and dedicates that tree to the memory of Henry F. McKenna; and be it further

TREE DEDICATION CEREMONY

Sunday, October 26, 1997

Henry McKenna was born on June 12, 1914 in Boston where he lived in the Dorchester section during his early years. After graduating from B.C. High, he worked as a shipbuilder at the Fore River Shipyard in Quincy. A World War II Navy veteran, he was stationed in the Aleutian Islands. He didn't like to tell war stories, but rather to get on with his life as a civilian.

It was after his military service that Henry began working for the U.S. Postal Service at the South Postal Annex. He was transferred to the Union Square Post Office in Somerville where he worked for 30 years. Henry acquired many true friends along his route, especially the nuns and workers at St. Anthony's School. To this day people he knew along his route still tell of the fond memories they have of Henry.

He was married in 1955 to Mary Hooker, a second-generation Cantabridgian, and moved into the family home at 51 Fayette Street where he lived the rest of his life. They were happily married for 26 years and raised 4 children in what was a very loving and happy home.

To Henry, family always came first, and he played an active role in everything his children were involved in. He also took the time to be like a second dad to his children's friends. He was helpful, patient, and always led by example. We were proud to have him as our Dad. He was the definition of a father. Now, as adults and parents ourselves, we try to emulate the example he set.

After a day of toting his mailbag up and down the hills of Somerville, Henry wasn't content to sit back but became active in the Cambridge community. He was an enthusiastic volunteer with the Cub Scout troop at the Longfellow School.

So much so that he became Cub master, which he served as for nearly a decade even long after his son, Tommy, had left scouting. As Cub master he nurtured many kids and helped the cause of scouting through weekly pack activities, fund raising and running camping trips.

Henry also coached Cambridge Little League baseball. In the Central League he taught the skills he learned in park league to the kids of Cambridge. Players and parents alike had much respect for his caring and leadership.

Throughout his children's years in elementary and high school, Henry volunteered as a school tutor. Whenever called upon to chaperone, transport or anything else that was asked of him, he never said no. He loved to do it. He offered support and guidance not only to his own children but also their friends. He was as happy watching his daughters, Susan, Nancy and Jean, cheerleading as he was to watch his son, Tommy, throw a touchdown pass. He took great pride in all of his kids' achievements.

Henry was also a devoted husband. He and his wife, Mary, loved each other's company and enjoyed family, friends, and church activities at St. Mary's. They liked dinner parties with their many friends, weekend getaways to the Cape, and vacations with their children. Friends and relatives would often drop by the house just to have a few laughs and talk with him and Mary.

And so, today we dedicate this tree to Henry McKenna's memory. We dedicate this tree with love and respect. We dedicate this tree with the love and respect Henry showed to others. Like this tree, his roots in Cambridge run deep. His eight grandchildren, Kim, Mike, Erin, Kristen, Robin, Kevin, Matthew and Michael, whom he did not get to watch grow up, may now watch his memorial tree as it grows. They will be reminded of the strong family roots Henry planted and nurtured and of what a great man their grandfather was. Good neighbor, caring friend, loving husband and father. Henry McKenna made his mark in Cambridge and in all of our lives.

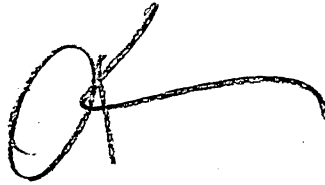
