Dear Mr. Mayor:

For myself and my family I want to express to you our deep appreciation of your considerate goodwill in making and carrying out the arrangements for the service at Appleton Chapel yesterday.

My father was, with a few intervals incident to travel, continuously a resident and citizen of Cambridge from the time he entered college in 1849. He made his first home and built his first house in Cambridge, and in early manhood served in the City Government. He has always loved the city, and as you know, has been keenly interested in the welfare of the community, the health and prosperity of his fellow-citizens, and the beauty of the streets and public grounds and buildings. During the years of his administration of the University he was constantly at pains to preserve and upbuild happy relations and further cooperation between the City Government and the Governing Boards of the University.

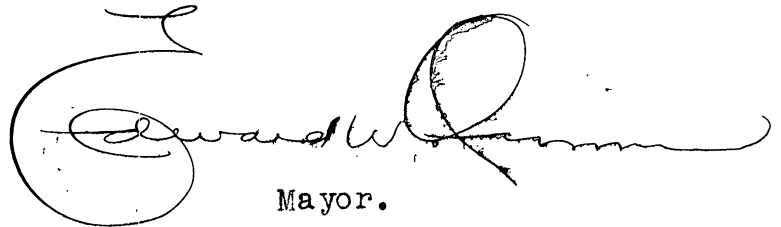
