

A MESSAGE TO CAMBRIDGE HOSPITAL CEO JOHN O'BRIEN:

Cambridge as a community has a rich history of striving to respect and protect the economic and social health and well-being of all individuals. In no city institution are these important principles more evident than in the Cambridge Hospital.

We believe the Cambridge Hospital should ensure these values are reflected in all of its operations, including its contracts for outside services such as laundry services.

We further believe that the Cambridge Hospital should contract only with a laundry service company that respects its workers, the law, and the community in which it does business and, accordingly, meets the following minimum standards:

- Pays its employees a living wage;
- Provides its employees with basic benefits including employer-paid family health insurance;
- Complies with federal health and safety laws and regulations and acts responsibly with respect to the special health hazards to employees posed by hospital laundry work;
- Complies with federal labor laws and respects and recognizes employees' rights to organize and to collective action;

Dear City Officials:

We are writing to forward to you the enclosed petitions which represent the voices of hundreds if not thousands of individuals and organizations who live, work, and operate in Cambridge. The message of the petitions is clear: the community of Cambridge values the social and economic well-being of everyone in the community, and the City should not be contracting with companies that disregard these principles.

Royal Institutional Services does not meet basic standards of human decency. It does not provide a living wage for its employees nor benefits such as affordable family health insurance. Its record is tainted by its history of violating health and safety regulations and environmental regulations. It is under investigation by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination, and is being taken to court by the National Labor Relations Board.

Royal Institutional Services is also being investigated by the City. As these petitions make clear, we want the City to do business only with companies that obey the law and treat their employees with decency and respect. While Royal's regulatory record is disturbing, we find just as problematic Royal's day-to-day treatment of its workers and the fact that employees of Royal do not earn wages above the poverty line and are not provided basic benefits that would allow them to care for their families. There is no more basic worker treatment issue than whether people take enough home every week to survive. A diligent investigation of Royal will reveal all of these facts.
