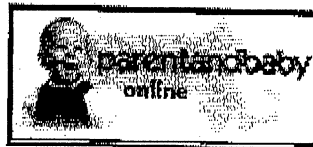

John A. P. Good, 71; Former Democratic State Committee member

John A. P. Good died on Dec. 15 at Mt. Auburn Hospital in Cambridge. He was 71.

Mr. Good was a lifelong resident of Cambridge. He was a U.S. Army veteran of the Korean War.

He was a former Democratic State Committee member, and served as a Cambridge School Committee member in the 1960s. He was a trustee of the Cambridge Hospital, and a member of the Cambridge Library Board and the Telephone Pioneers Club of New England. He was a volunteer at Massachusetts General Hospital and at the information booth in Harvard Square.

He was a parishioner of St. Peter's Church in Cambridge, served on the parish council and the St. Peter's School Board, and was president of the St. Vincent dePaul Society.

He was the husband of the late Edna E. (Murphy) Good; son of the late Francis and Irene (O'Connell) Good; and brother of Francis J. of Scituate, Frederick L. of Belmont, Albert E. of Dover, and the late Sr. Irene R. Good, R.S.C.J. He is also survived by many nieces and nephews.

Remembering a good man

Cambridge has lost an extraordinary treasure with the passing of John Good, who died of heart failure on Dec. 15. A lifelong resident of Cambridge, he gave of himself to our city in many ways over his 71 years. I was privileged to know him during the last five years of his time on earth, when I grew to admire and love him.

Mr. Good was my colleague on the Cambridge Board of Library Trustees. His devotion to that institution was matched only by his commitment to the patrons it serves and the workers it employs. Each time, and there are many, an employee distinguished him or herself at work, it has been John, on behalf of the trustees, who remembered to issue a special commendation or simple thank you for a job well done. An employee or library patron with a problem could always count on John to try and resolve the issue in a caring and sensitive way. Mr. Good graced the library board for almost 20 years.

Though Mr. Good's profile is not that of a classic feminist, and he was an old-time gentleman all the way, one incident made me see that you don't have to think of yourself as a feminist to be one. After Tip O'Neill's death, a request was to name the branch closest to the O'Neill home, on Rindge Avenue, for the former speaker. Frankly, I wasn't excited. Despite consistently casting my vote for Mr. O'Neill, I thought that he'd received many honors already, and this one could go to someone else, perhaps a woman. But I was relatively new to the trustees, didn't deeply object, and didn't want to offend Mr. Good, whom I already liked so much. I'd typecast him, making the assumption he would support the proposal, since he himself was an elderly white man of Irish descent, and that he was a supporter of Tip. However, when the time came to decide the matter, Mr. Good raised his hand and spoke thus: "I'm in favor of naming the Rindge Avenue branch, and if the rest of you want to name it for Tip O'Neill, I'll go along, because he was a great man. But I've been thinking: who was it that stayed home and cared for those O'Neill children? Who took them to the Rindge Avenue branch of the library? Who was really there

for them to teach them right from wrong? Who was it? It was Milly, that's who, and I propose, therefore, that we name our branch the Mildred O'Neill Library." As anyone can see from the sign on the library, we all agreed. The library hosted a lovely naming ceremony which Mrs. O'Neill attended with some members of her family and we've all felt good about it ever since. I learned a lesson about stereotyping, too. Being more open than others would have expected of him was typical of John.

Although Mr. and Mrs. Good never had children (I can almost hear John saying, "God didn't bless my Edna and me in that particular way.") he was a lover of children, and they were drawn to him. When my kids were around, he'd talk to them, give them something he might have in his pocket and be sure to tell them what a terrific mom they had. Another expression of his caring for our city and its children was the two terms John served on the School Committee.

One of John's other great loves was for his religion and his church, St. Peter's on Concord Avenue. He was a true Christian in the most literal sense, in the love he gave freely to his fellow humans, his ability to empathize, his willingness to put others before himself, his good works too numerous to mention, his interest in and tolerance of those different from himself. A devoted Catholic, he took great pleasure in sharing other people's traditions. The last time I saw him, at the trustees' December meeting, he relished the Chanukah gelt (chocolate coins) I brought to distribute.

I never met a man more in love with his wife. Any time he spoke of her, she was "my Edna," even after her death last year. Through her terminal illness, he never lost hope and cared for her in the most loving of ways. He always spoke of her with enormous respect as well as tenderness. Their marriage lasted some 40 years.

Mr. Good also enjoyed his volunteer work. He served as one of Cambridge's ambassadors at the Harvard Square kiosk, helping visitors find their way. When John was on the job, all of Cambridge could rest easy that visitors would receive proper, even courtly, treatment; Cambridge's image was more important to him than his own. Friday

was his day ministering to the sick at Massachusetts General Hospital, visiting and helping out in any way he could. What a kindly, comforting presence he must have been to those in need there.

Many who knew him commented throughout his life how aptly named was our friend John. He was just so good. His brother-in-law's eulogy at the very moving funeral service I attended at St. Peter's contained this description of John: "He was a simple man with an extraordinary talent for the everyday beauty of life and living." And he was an inspiring friend to all of us who were lucky enough to know him. Each day, I will try my best to be a little more John Good-like and grateful for the example he left behind.

The Board of Library Trustees has initiated a plan to name the children's room of the main library in memory of John. We have also proposed that one of the intersections near St. Peter's Church on Concord Avenue be named the John and Edna Good Square. We further hope that the City Council will honor John by deciding to build a new and splendid main library. John's passing has provided us with another excellent reason to give Cambridge a new library; it's what John Good would have wanted to leave as a legacy to the city and citizens he loved.

Find room for seniors to vol

Recently, an older gentleman told me that as far as he was concerned, he was "just putting in time." True, the exigencies of his life have left him without family or close friends in the area, and his health is not the greatest, but he is very far from being homebound.

How many times have we heard older persons express similar sentiments? A news story I read several years ago burns in my memory. With a picture of an older woman sitting at the kitchen table with her middle-aged daughter, she is reported as saying, "My life should be over; there is no reason for me to be here anymore."

It is precisely these kinds of stories that moved a group of senior citizens to establish the Cambridge Senior Volunteer Clearinghouse to help create a new opportunity for seniors to find a niche to give purpose to their lives. For example, one woman said she volunteers at two jobs to keep her busy all the time, "otherwise, life would be too grim."

Another case, a retired woman of some means, who was living on the Cape with her husband, enjoying a social life, drinking socially, started to take a drink in the afternoon. Why not, there was nothing she had to do. Then, the old story of one drink becoming two, but she controlled herself somehow and no one thought of her as an alcoholic.

Fortunately, she caught herself when driving her daughter and granddaughter to the airport. She suddenly realized that she did not have control of the car and asked her daughter to take over the wheel. She said she was alarmed that she could be in the position of smashing up these two precious people. Her husband started driving her for regular drug rehab counseling where she was confronted for the first time with the fact that she had not developed any sufficient purpose for living in later life.

Of course, we cannot generalize to the whole population of older people from these anecdotes. We all know older people with a lot of guts doing great things with their lives. What we don't know is how many persons there are who are just "putting in time," or, at least, passing the days with their greatest connection to society coming from the television soaps.

The moral of this story is that the number of those of us over 60 is growing so fast that in a couple of decades, 20 percent of the national population will join it. That amounts to around 60 million persons. It will be very demoralizing to society in general if many of them feel they are just putting in time.

Society has not adjusted to the change of longevity in our time. People spend 30 years growing up and getting settled in life, 30 years developing careers and caring for family, and then there are 30 years

Maybe money does grow on trees

You know how important it is to look out your window and see leaves and tree branches instead of concrete and asphalt. But did you know that a monetary value could be assigned to the benefits that trees provide?

As it turns out, trees provide dollar savings on a scale that is hard to grasp. The savings in energy costs, pollution control, storm water management, water quality and erosion control are vast. For example, a recent study by the Forest Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture concluded the following:

- Trees in the Chicago area removed an estimated 6,145 tons of air pollutants in a single year, a pollution control service equaling \$9.2 million.

- These same trees sequestered or stored approximately 155,000 tons of carbon per year and the cooling effects of their shade resulted in energy savings, which in turn reduced carbon emissions from power plants by about 12,600 tons annually.

- The water storing capacity of their systems saved \$818,000 in flood water storage.

The benefits, the study concludes, outweigh the costs of planting and maintaining trees 2-1. Studies in Los Angeles, Calif., as well as

in Marlboro, reach similar conclusions.

The hard dollar savings and the intangible, but significant, contribution trees make to the quality of life in cities argues for substantial urban tree-care programs. Since all three studies agree that the benefits of trees begin to outweigh the cost after 10 years of age and as trees get older, it is important that trees live as long as possible to provide their greatest benefit.

The benefits of trees described in the above studies apply the trees of Cambridge as well. However, until a detailed study is done here, we can only guess. Cambridge's Urban Forestry Division completed a street
