

REPORT OF THE PERAMBULATION OF THE BOUNDARY LINE
BETWEEN THE CITY OF CAMBRIDGE AND THE
TOWN OF BELMONT

To the City Council of the City of Cambridge and the Selectmen of the
Town of Belmont

Gentlemen:

The undersigned committee, duly appointed by the City Council of the City of Cambridge and the Selectmen of the Town of Belmont to perambulate the boundary lines between said city and town, would respectfully report that they did on *Feb 4, 1971* examine the boundary line dividing said city and town and that they found monuments as described below marked and standing in their proper positions.

Beginning at a stone bound in the boundary line between the Town of Watertown and the City of Cambridge, as established by an Act of the Legislature Chapter 181, and approved March 24, 1922, said bound being six inches below the surface of Belmont Street. This bound is situated about 1,100.0 feet from the junction of Belmont and Mt. Auburn Streets and is ten and fifteen hundredths (10.15) feet northerly from a stone witness monument situated on the southerly line of Belmont Street. Thence, almost due north three and twenty six hundredths (3.26) feet to a stone numbered 10 (which is about one foot below the surface of the street.) Thence, almost due north by the same line about two thousand and eighty-two and five tenths (2082.5) feet to a stone bound marked "B.C." at the Town of Belmont Cemetery. Thence, turning and following the line of the Cemetery fence in a south-easterly direction three-hundred fifty seven and one half feet to a stone bound marked "B.C." This bound is at times below the level of the water in former Cider Mill Pond and a witness bound has been placed on the shore and twelve feet westerly away from the true corner. Thence turning and still running along the Cemetery wall in a northeasterly direction forty-four feet to a stone bound marked "B.C." - thence, turning and running along the Cemetery wall

in a nearly northerly direction two hundred thirty two and four tenths (232.4) feet to a stone bound marked "B.C."

This bound is also at times below the water level in former Cider Mill Pond and a cut has been made in a stone boulder in the wall over the bound. Thence, turning and running along the Cemetery wall in a northeasterly direction ninety nine (99.0) feet to an angle. This point is under water and a reference bound has been set in the Cemetery nine feet (9.0) away and in a westerly direction from the true corner. Thence, turning and following the wall of the Cemetery in a northerly direction one hundred sixty-four (164.0) feet to a bound marked "B.C." at the northeasterly corner of said Cemetery and Huron Avenue. Thence, turning and running in a northwesterly direction along the southwesterly line of Huron Avenue about five hundred and ninety feet (590.0) to an unmarked stone bound set flush with the street surface;-thence, turning at right angle and running northeasterly forty one and twenty-five one hundredths (41.25) feet across said Huron Avenue to a stone bound marked "B.C." - thence, northerly along the easterly side of Grove Street, in Belmont (formerly Huron Avenue in Cambridge) one thousand seven hundred seventy-two and twenty five one hundredths (1,772.25) feet to a point in the northerly line of Washington Street, at it's intersection with Blanchard Road in Cambridge, said point being marked by a stone bound set flush with the street surface and being forty two and seventy five hundredths (42.75) feet easterly from the old stone bound marked "B.C." - thence, easterly and northerly along the former northerly and westerly lines of Blanchard Road two thousand one hundred thirty nine and seventy five one hundredths (2,139.75) feet to a hole in road directly over a stone bound on the southerly side of the old location of Concord Avenue;-thence, running in the same northerly direction along the westerly line of Blanchard Road one thousand three hundred and sixty one and five tenths (1,361.5) feet to a pipe set in concrete over the R. C. culvert of Wellington Brook. Thence, turning and running in a northeasterly direction seven hundred twenty four and five tenths (724.5) feet to a stone

bound marked "B.C." at a point where the original location line of the Fitchburg Railroad crosses Wellington Brook. Thence, turning and running a little more northerly two thousand two hundred and thirty-four (2,234.0) feet to a stone bound marked "A.B.C." on the old dividing line between Cambridge and Arlington which bound is about two thousand seven hundred-eighty and twenty seven hundredths (2780.27) feet (see Metropolitan Park Plan, No. A-240 showing correct location) as measured on said last dividing line from the witness bound near the junction of Alewife Brook and Little River.
