Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Eighteen, entitled "Vehicles and Traffic" is hereby amended by striking out all sections thereof except section 18-1, "Adoption of Traffic Regulations by Reference", and adding a new section 18-2 entitled: "Resident Parking Stickers and Visitor Permits", as follows:

Sec. 18-2. Resident Parking Stickers and Visitor Permits

Resident Parking Stickers issued by the Cambridge Traffic Director pursuant to St. 1961, c.455, s3(a), as amended by St. 1972, c.340 and St. 1981, c.166, and pursuant to Cambridge Traffic Regulations, Article XVI, section 16.3(c) and 16.4(b) are intended only for the personal use of the persons to whom they are issued.

No person shall sell, offer for sale, give, trade or otherwise transfer his or her Resident Parking Sticker to another person or affix said sticker to a motor vehicle not his own, or alter said Sticker.

Resident Parking Visitor Permits issued by the Cambridge Traffic Director, pursuant to said statutes and said Regulations are intended only for the personal use of guests who are actually visiting the household to which the permit was issued.

No person shall sell or offer for sale a Resident Parking Visitor Permit to anyone, or alter said Permit.

Any person who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of not more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for each offense.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance entitled "The Zoning Ordinances of the City of Cambridge".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

The Zoning Map accompanying ordinance passed to be ordained September 26, 1979 entitled "The Zoning Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" is hereby amended as follows:

1. By rezoning to Residence C-1 that area presently zoned Industrial B-1 insofar as it relates to the following described area of land:
Part of lot No. 124 on Assessor's Plat No. 76:

Beginning at a point said point being the northeasterly corner of Lot No. 124;

Thence proceeding northwesterly along the northeasterly lot line of Lot. No. 124 more or less four feet to a point said point being the intersection of the northeasterly lot line of Lot. No. 124 and a line 100 feet easterly of and parallel to the easterly sideline of Windsor St. (said line being at present the boundary between the area to the west at present zoned Residence C-1 and the area to the east to be rezoned Residence C-1 at present zoned Industrial B-1);

Thence turning left and proceeding southerly along said line 100 feet easterly of and parallel to the easterly sideline of Windsor St. more or less 14 feet to a point said point being the intersection of said line 100 feet easterly of and parallel to the easterly sideline of Windsor St. and the southeasterly lot line of Lot. Thence turning left and proceeding northeasterly along the southeasterly lot line of Lot. No. 124 more or less 16 feet to the point of origin.

2. By rezoning to Industrial B-1 that area at present zoned Residence C-1 insofar as it relates to the following described area of land:
Part of Lot. No. 122 on Assessor's Plat No. 76:

Beginning at a point said point being the southwesterly corner of Lot. No. 122;

Thence proceeding southeasterly along the southwesterly lot line of Lot. No. 122 more or less 12.5 feet to a point said point being the intersection of the southwesterly lot line of lot. No. 122 and a line 100 feet easterly of and parallel to the easterly sideline of Windsor St. (said line being at present the boundary between the area to the east at present zoned Industrial B-1 and the area to the west to be rezoned to Industrial B-1 at present zoned Residence C-1);

Thence turning left and proceeding northerly along said line 100 feet easterly of and parallel to the easterly sideline of Windsor St. more or less 55 feet to a point said point being the intersection of said line 100 feet easterly of and parallel to the easterly sideline of Windsor St. and the northwesterly lot line of lot. 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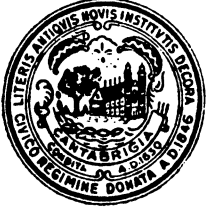

Think stink
City Councilor Alfred LaRosa raised a stinky issue in the council on Monday.

At the meeting, LaRosa introduced a resolution to address a potential public health problem created by offensive and perhaps hazardous odors emanating from the sewers on Cambridge street from Fifth to Ninth streets.

The resolution, accepted by the council, orders Commissioner of Public Works Everett Kennedy to take appropriate steps to ensure a comprehensive cleaning and fumigation program for the entire city. The resolution further orders that a formal method be established for residents to phone or write the Public Works Department with complaints of this nature.

Delaying Grace

City Councilor Alice Wolf introduced a resolution to delay development of the W.R. Grace site in North Cambridge until officials have completed review of a report on pollutants at the site.

The resolution, approved by the council, orders City Manager Robert Healy to report to the council on activities at the Grace site, his review of the Grace technical report on pollutants there and his plans for monitoring development at the site. The resolution also orders that no city permits be issued for the site until the council has reviewed Healy's report.

Sister of Soviets

The tragic death of America's latest ambassador to the Soviet Union did not go unnoticed in Cambridge.

The city council passed a resolution introduced by Mayor Francis Duguay extending the city council's deepest sympathy to the family of Samantha and Arthur Smith.

The resolution notes that the late Mayor Leonard J. Russell shared Samantha's hope for peace when he proposed the Soviet Sister City Project to the city council and that Cambridge is fortunate enough to have the will, the resourcefulness

'Hall Stars' play for charity

Fresh from their recent victory over their Somerville counterparts in the fourth Annual Cambridge-Somerville Mayor's Challenge Cup Softball Game, a group of city administrators and employees will be fielding a softball team to accept a number of challenge games that have been proposed to them.

The team, known as the "City Hall Stars," was put together by John Courtney and John Pasquarello of the city's Inspectional Services Department to raise money for charity with a series of games against teams from the State House, Middlesex County Courthouse, the Knights of Columbus and others. UNIQUE PRESCRIPTIONS

It is estimated that physicians, dentists, podiatrists, and other health professionals produce over one billion prescriptions each year. And each one of these prescriptions is in some way unique to the individual for whom it is prescribed. For almost every prescription, the following must be determined: (1) the type of medicine to be used, (2) the dosage regimen (once daily, twice daily, etc.), (3) the dosage form (liquid, tablet, suppository, etc.), and (4) the quantity of medicine to be dispensed and, therefore, the duration of therapy.

The prescriber must take into consideration factors such as age, weight, sex, and general condition of health of the patient. Other medicines being taken must also be considered because of drug-drug interactions. Even diet and drug-food interactions must be evaluated.

Because every prescription is in some way unique to each patient, it is an unwise health practice to use the prescription medicines of others. What is good for one person may be harmful to another—even when taken according to labeled directions.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Eighteen, entitled "Vehicles and Traffic" is hereby amended by striking out all sections thereof except section 18-1, "Adoption of Traffic Regulations by Reference", and adding a new section 18-2 entitled: "Resident Parking Stickers and Visitor Permits", as follows:

Sec. 18-2. Resident Parking Stickers and Visitor Permits

Resident Parking Stickers issued by the Cambridge Traffic Director pursuant to St. 1961, c.455, s3(a), as amended by St. 1972, c.340 and St. 1981, c.166, and pursuant to Cambridge Traffic Regulations, Article XVI, section 16.3(c) and 16.4(b) are intended only for the personal use of the persons to whom they are issued.

No person shall sell, offer for sale, give, trade or otherwise transfer his or her Resident Parking Sticker to another person or affix said sticker to a motor vehicle not his own, or alter said Sticker.

Resident Parking Visitor Permits issued by the Cambridge Traffic Director, pursuant to said statutes and said Regulations are intended only for the personal use of guests who are actually visiting the household to which the permit was issued.

No person shall sell or offer for sale a Resident Parking Visitor Permit to anyone, or alter said Permit.

Any person who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of not more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for each offense.

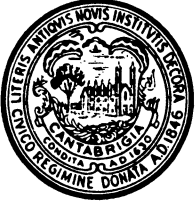
