AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an Ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "the Code of the City of Cambridge."

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Eleven entitled: "Health, Hospitals and Housing" is hereby amended by inserting the following article:

ARTICLE IV
ORDINANCE FOR THE CARE AND USE OF LABORATORY
ANIMALS IN THE CITY OF CAMBRIDGE

Section 11-30. DEFINITIONS

In the context of this Ordinance the following definitions are adopted:

- (a) An animal is any nonhuman vertebrate.
- (b) An experiment is any procedure conducted by a research institution upon a live animal.
- (c) A painful experiment is as defined in 9 CFR Part 1, sec. 1.1.
- (d) A research institution is any facility operated in the City of Cambridge, any school or college of medicine, public health, dentistry, pharmacy, veterinary medicine, or agricultural, medical, biological, or diagnostic laboratory, biological corporation, hospital or other educational or scientific establishment within the City of Cambridge which, in connection with any of its activities, investigates or gives instruction concerning the structure and function of living organisms or the causes, prevention, control or cure of diseases or abnormal

Section 11-31. COMMISSIONER OF LABORATORY ANIMALS

The City Manager shall appoint a Commissioner of Laboratory Animals (CLA) for the purpose of overseeing the care and use of laboratory animals in the City of Cambridge. The Commissioner shall neither be aligned with an antivivisection nor a biomedical research organization or movement. The CLA's qualifications should include an understanding of animal welfare, health, physiology, psychology, and pathology, as well as the philosophy and goals of the animal welfare movement and scientific endeavor.

The CLA shall use the February 24, 1989 Joint Report of the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Committee on the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals in Cambridge as a guide to his or her oversight of the care and use of laboratory animals in Cambridge.

Section 11-32. REGISTRATION AND REGISTRATION FEE

Each research institution shall register with the CLA within ninety days of the enactment of this Ordinance or the first day of conducting experiments in Cambridge. The City Manager is authorized to establish fees to be paid by the research institutions to cover implementation of this Ordinance.

Section 11-33. GUIDELINES FOR THE CARE AND USE OF ANIMALS

All experiments on all animals within the City of Cambridge shall be undertaken in conformity with all federal, state, and local statutes, ordinances, and regulations concerning the welfare of animals including the Guide for the Care and Use of Animals of the National Institutes of Health, the Animal Welfare Act (7 U.S.C. sections 2131, et seq.), the Health

research Extension Act of 1985, the Public Health Service Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals, G.L. c. 140, s. 174D, and 105 CMR 910.000 et seq., all as amended or revised from time to time.

Section 11-34. ANIMAL CARE AND USE COMMITTEES

Each institution that performs research, experiments, or biotechnical procedures using animals shall maintain or establish an autonomous animal care and use committee with the power to disapprove or restrict research, experiments, or biotechnical procedures regarding the care and use of laboratory animals in accordance with the standards set forth in Section 11-33. Each animal care and use committee shall have a member who is not and has not been affiliated with the institution. This member shall be appointed by the chief executive officer of the institution subject to the approval of the CLA.

(a) No person shall sit upon an animal care and use committee who has an economic interest, other than in the funding of an experiment or in salary, in experiments that come before the animal care and use committee.

(b) No more than one-half of the membership of an animal care and use committee shall be composed of persons who engage in experiments subject to review by the animal care and use committee.

(c) All members of the animal care and use committee shall have unrestricted access to all areas in which animals are housed or used in experiments and to protocols of all experiments, subject only to such limitations as have been given prior approval in writing by the CLA.

(d) Descriptions of all experiments conducted at the research institution, written in easily understood language, shall be provided to the animal care and use committee. These descriptions shall include the number and species of animals killed during or after each experiment and the manner

in which they are to be killed, and shall justify the number and species of animals used in the experiment as well as the experiment's scientific necessity.

(e) Each animal care and use committee shall keep accurate minutes of its deliberations and regularly forward them to the CLA. Section 11-35.

REPORTS AND INFORMATION

Each animal care and use committee of each research institution shall provide the following information for review by the CLA at the time of his annual visit:

(a) The number of species of animals used in the previous year.

(b) The results of all federal and state inspections concerning animal care and use in the previous year.

(c) The name and occupation of the non-affiliated members of the animal care and use committee.

(d) The dates of meetings of the animal care and use committee held in the previous year.

(e) The number of experiments or protocols for procedures reviewed by the animal care and use committee in the previous year.

Section 11-36. REPORTS OF VIOLATIONS

The CLA shall report any violation of the standards prescribed in section 11-33 to the chief executive officer of the research institution.

Section 11-37. INSPECTIONS AND INVESTIGATIONS

The CLA shall make at least one annual visit to each research institution to inspect animal and research facilities and hold at least one annual meeting with the chairperson and with the non-affiliated member of the animal care and use committee to discuss its work. The CLA may inspect any animal care and use committee reports and documents on his annual

visit. The CLA shall make unannounced visits to inspect animal and research facilities as needed. Meetings and inspections should be made to ensure that the standards set forth in section 11-33 are being followed. The CLA shall report to the City Manager from time to time and may make recommendations to him regarding the care and use of laboratory animals within the City of Cambridge.

Section 11-38. TRADE SECRETS

It shall be unlawful for any member of an animal care and use committee to release any confidential information of the research institution including information that concerns or relates to:

- (1) Trade secrets; or,
- (2) Confidential statistical data, amount or sources of income, profits, losses or expenditures of the research institution to any person but the Commissioner.

Notwithstanding clauses (1) or (2), no information relating to or affecting the treatment of animals by the research institution including information about any violations of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be confidential information of the research institution.

Section 11-39. VIOLATIONS

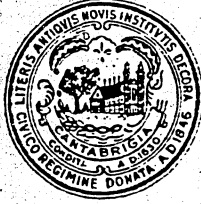
Any research institution that violates this Ordinance shall, after hearing by the Commissioner, be punished by a fine of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per violation per day. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense. The Commissioner, after hearing, may withdraw the registration and order closed any research institution or portion thereof that engages in repeated violations of this Ordinance and seize and board or euthanize at the expense of the research institution the animals affected.

Section 11-40. SEVERABILITY OF SECTIONS

Nothing in this Ordinance shall prohibit anything otherwise required by federal or state law. If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

Passed to a second reading at the City Council meeting held on June 12, 1989 and on or after June 26, 1989 the question comes on passing to be ordained.

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge," as revised in 1972, and now designated as the Cambridge Municipal Code.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

1. Chapter 8.16 (Noise) is hereby amended by striking out the present section 8.16.150 (Violation - Penalty) and inserting in place thereof the following new section 8.16.150, which reads as follows:

8.16.150 Violation - Penalty

A. Criminal Penalty

Any person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$50. for each offense.

B. Noncriminal Disposition

Whoever violates any provision of this chapter may be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided in G.L. c. 40, s. 21D. For purposes of this section, the following officials shall be enforcing persons: Police Officers, Dog Officers, Inspectional Services Inspectors and Parking Control Officers. The penalty for each violation will be \$25.

2. Chapter 8.28 (Smoking) is hereby amended by striking out the present section 8.28.090 (Violation - Penalty) and inserting in place thereof the following new section 8.28.090, which reads as follows:

8.28.090 Violation - Penalty

A. Criminal Penalty

Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this chapter, or who smokes in an area in which a "Smoking Prohibited By-law" notice is conspicuously posted as required by Section 8.28.070, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$50. for each offense.

B. Noncriminal Disposition

Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this chapter, or who smokes in an area in which a "Smoking Prohibited By-law" notice is conspicuously posted as required by Section 8.28.070, may be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided in G.L. c. 40, s. 21D. For purposes of this section, the following officials shall be enforcing persons: Police Officers, Dog Officers, Inspectional Services Inspectors and Parking Control Officers. The penalty for each violation will be \$25.

3. Chapter 8.24 (Rubbish, Garbage and Litter) is hereby amended by striking out the present section 8.24.260 (Violation - Penalty) and inserting in place thereof the following new section 8.24.260, which reads as follows:

8.24.260 Violation - Penalty

A. Criminal Penalty

Any person who violates any section of this chapter shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$50. Each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

B. Noncriminal Disposition

Whoever violates any provision of this chapter may be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided in G.L. c. 40, s. 21D. For purposes of this section, the Commissioner of Public Works shall be the enforcing officer, except that the Commissioner may delegate his enforcing authority to designated Public Works Enforcement Officers. The penalty for each violation will be \$25. Each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

4. Chapter 12.08 (Advertising Signs and Displays) is hereby amended by striking out the present section 12.08.070 (Violation - Penalty) and inserting in place thereof the following new section 12.08.070, which reads as follows:

12.08.070 Violation - Penalty

A. Criminal Penalty

Any person who violates any section of this chapter shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$50., and each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

B. Noncriminal Disposition

Whoever violates any provision of this chapter may be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided in G.L. c. 40, s. 21D. For purposes of this section, the Commissioner of Public Works shall be the enforcing officer, except that the Commissioner may delegate his enforcing authority to designated Public Works Enforcement Officers. The penalty for each violation will be \$25. Each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

5. Chapter 12.16 (Street and Sidewalk Use Regulations) is hereby amended by adding the following new section 12.16.160, which reads as follows:

12.16.160 Violation - Penalty

A. Criminal Penalty

Any person who violates section 12.16.110 (Sidewalks - Snow and ice removal) shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$50. Each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

B. Noncriminal Disposition

Whoever violates section 12.16.110 (Sidewalks - Snow and ice removal) may be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided in G.L. c. 40, s. 21D. The penalty for each violation will be \$25. Each day's violation shall constitute a separate offense.

For once, it's worth filing 1th Chapter

When I take a friend of mine to the 11th Chapter Saloon in Somerville, Ave. it takes a while for her to stop slapping at the backspine books on the shelves. There will be no business for herself and isn't interested in learning more about what concept of business. There will be no regular filing into the restaurant has provided her with fiscal irregularity.

The books and the names of the place are a joke, I think. Although most of the books are... and a very flexible, low key one

— the place is very serious about its food. If you like to eat, grilled meat in an engaging setting, you might want to learn more about this satisfying eating hole.

The clientele is a nice mix of Somerville old and new. They sit at the bar or at tables with high chairs along an exposed brick wall and under hanging plants and ceiling fans. They enjoy their friends, the live acoustic music Thursdays through Saturdays, or the big TV. If you're hungry, you might prefer to sit in the den or on times I've sought sanctuary in the 11th Chapter, I've yet to see any South Bay behavior. The bartender doubles as a grill-

cooker. If you're sitting at the bar, he'll take your order. For appetizers I recommend the Labatts (\$2.50 for 16 oz. glass), Sam Adams or Bass Ale (\$2.50 for 16 oz.). They're all good. If you're hungry and can't wait for the food to arrive, try the chips and salsa (\$3.50). It's rather fresh and spicy, with just a hint of cilantro.

The 11th Chapter has a limited, but excellent, menu. There are two meats, however. The grilled beef chop (18.95) and the grilled pork chop (18.95) are seasoned in a secret marinade and are invariably grilled to perfection. The menu comes with a good heap of steak

from 7 to 11:30 pm, you can get a (fresh) pan-broiled. The steak tips had chops rare as rare of the best wakers around. Good luck finding a better, fatter, for less.

Other items include a grilled chicken breast (13.95), grilled beef and cheese omelet and cheese sandwiches (\$4), an excellent chili (\$2 a cup; \$3.50 for a bowl with cheese), and an assortment of sandwiches for \$1.25.

Management has taken pains to make the 11th Chapter more than just another grilling spot. With its food, atmosphere and music, it doubled the 11th Chapter will ever live up to its name.

Hospital over \$1 million in care provided under Medicare, Medicaid, and free care for people who cannot pay the high cost of medical bills. Last week O'Brien got a check for \$1.6 million, and he expects another payment for \$2.4 million in June. Accounting to Rep. Peter Vitelloni, D-Cambridge, who worked with O'Brien and House Majority Leader Charles F. Wicks (D-Cambridge) to organize a payment schedule, most of the remaining \$6 million owed to the hospital should be paid sometime this summer.

"My concern is that we have a constitutional," Vitelloni said. That appears to be the case, at least for this year.

"We're well on the way to finding that," said L. Edward Lashman, secretary of administration and finance for Gov. Michael Dukakis, speaking before the Cambridge City Council Monday night. "I would like to be joined with us," Lashman told the council, apologizing for the delay in reorganizing the hospital for paying out the state's own fiscal obligations. "We're doing our best to respond to your needs."

Even though state payments in this fiscal year (ending June 30) will fall short of \$10 million, the hospital will not go over budget — a testament to prudent planning by the city and the hospital administration.

Historically subsidised by city taxes to keep its doors open to the poor, the hospital this year was budgeted for a \$7.6 million subsidy from the city even if the state did not default on its payments. Although the

neighborhood health centers and treated for free or below actual cost are not from the city, without state help the city ends up paying most of the bills.

Barry new state taxes to pay for these programs, the taxpayers of Cambridge will have to carry a larger portion of the financial burden of the hospital. Because of the uncertainty of state support, the projected deficit for fiscal 1990 is roughly \$4 million higher than this year, or \$11 million. The state situation depends that the hospital look to the legislature for temporary relief, officials say.

"Not only will the hospital have to rely more heavily on the city, but services may have to be cut next year in order to survive. Another O'Brien plan to reduce the staff by 15 positions. Most of the reduction will be possible through attrition, he said, although there will be some layoffs. More cuts will come if the situation worsens."

The cuts will result at a time when hospital statistics are coming up hard times. As an example, Cambridge hospital is facing a 12 percent jump in staffing costs, and staffing makes up 74 percent of the budget.

O'Brien would not like to see city taxes go up any further to support the hospital, and the city's burden cannot increase much for that without coming close to the Proposition 2 1/2 cap. The only alternatives are to cut services and hope the state will renew their commitment.

"We clearly think that all of these cuts have to be fully funded and in our estimation it is inevitable that a new revenue package will be required," O'Brien said.

Hospital expands birthing services

Seemingly like a symbolic nod to the currently that despite hard times the work goes on, Cambridge Hospital on Friday inaugurated a new, neighborhood-based obstetrics and gynecology program. The hospital also increased the official designation of East Cambridge as a community that is medically underserved in the area of obstetrics and gynecology.

The program includes expansion of nurse-midwifery services which provide care for women before, during and after pregnancy. These services will be available at the hospital's six neighborhood health centers.

The announcement of the new program comes as state legislators and city officials are grappling with ways to overcome shortfalls in Medicaid, Medicare and uncompensated care costs (including what threatens the growth and financial health of the hospital).

East Cambridge was designated a medically "underserved" community based on a nationwide survey which showed that women in the area had less access to medical services than the federal government deems sufficient. US Rep. Joseph P. Kennedy voted as state legislators and city officials are grappling with ways to overcome shortfalls in Medicaid, Medicare and uncompensated care costs (including what threatens the growth and financial health of the hospital).

The new OB-GYN program will not only target East Cambridge, but all neighborhood health centers will benefit from the expansion.

Arnetta Rodrigues, an outreach worker at the East Cambridge Health Center, will offer childbearing education to Portuguese-speaking women and their partners.
