Mr. Larner's dedication never tired, either in his career or in regard to his own health. He was a successful doctor and he managed to keep himself in excellent condition up to the age of about 101 and a half, according to his nephew. At 101, Mr. Larner was awarded a Surgeon General Medallion for his work in Public Health Research and Practice.

Born in Cambridge, Mr. Larner spent most of his life in New Jersey. He took particular pleasure in playing harmonica for his grandchildren.

Mr. Larner was the husband of the late Lillian R. Larner and Mildred McCracken, the father of the late Sally Larner, and the step-father of Adelaide McCracken Wean, of Palm Beach, Fla. Expressionist painter

Katherine Eisenhart Brown, an abstract expressionist painter, died at Mount Auburn Hospital on the Sunday of the Passion. She was 76.

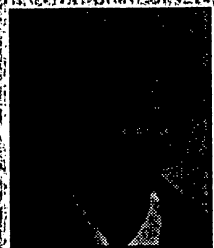
Mrs. Brown lived in Cambridge and was the founder and director of the Martin Street Dance Company. She was the wife of Robert P. Brown, a retired Boston architect.

All her life, Mrs. Brown enjoyed asymmetry, ambiguity, and the mystery of paradox. She was a member of the Boston Visual Artist Union, the Cambridge Art Association, and many other art organizations. She was a Copley Master at the Copley Society of Boston.

A native of Princeton, N.J., where her father was dean of the Graduate School at Princeton University, the former Katherine Reilly Eisenhart was educated at Miss Fine's School in Princeton and was Phi Beta Kappa at Vassar College. She received a master's degree in journalism at Columbia University.

Mrs. Brown was a teacher of art briefly at Buckingham Browne & Nichols and a reporter for the Burlington Free Press, but her life work combined painting, dance, the jazz music, and video. Her work is in the Corporate Collection of the Boston Globe, Bank of America, the Harvard Business School and Dean Witter.

Mrs. Brown's first husband, W. Danforth Compton, an architect from Scarsdale, N.Y., was the father of her two surviving children, John Parker Compton and Christina Compton. She is also survived by her two grandchildren, Vanessa and Ian Compton. The family will hold a celebration of Katherine's life and
