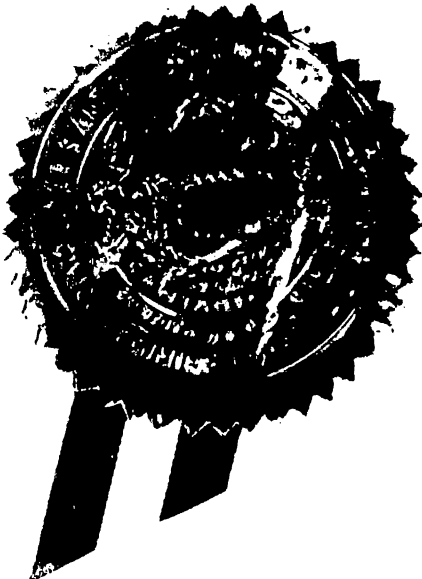

In City Council..... January 12, 1987

The Ordinance Committee comprised of the entire membership of the City Council, conducted a public hearing on Thursday, January 8, 1987 beginning at 7:35 p.m. in the Sullivan Chamber to discuss the Recodification of the General Ordinances.

City Clerk Joseph E. Connarton outlined the current status of the Recodification of the General Ordinances to the Committee and stated it was required to have a vote of the Ordinance Committee and City Council accepting or rejecting the proposed amendments or deletions to the current ordinances as part of the final Recodification process.

Councillor Wolf stated that although she supports the Recodification, having just received the proposed series of amendments, she would like some time to review them.

The City Clerk requested that the Ordinance Committee consider referring the proposed amendments to the full Council for passage to a second reading on Monday, January 12th and that prior to ordination the Council would have time to review the amendments to be considered and to offer any suggestions thereto. The City Clerk informed the Committee that the Council has the prerogative to either add, amend or reject amendments and or deletions prior to the formal vote on Recodification which should take place no later than January 31st, 1987 in order to stay within the time frame established with the City Solicitor and Book Publishing Company.

The City Clerk further informed the Committee that both the City Solicitor and the City Manager have provided much cooperation in this effort and that the Chairman of the Committee has provided much guidance in this effort.

Councillor Duehay requested that the Council be provided with copies of the proposed language changes as it relates to hackney carriages, projecting signs, loitering and the fee structure for rubbish collection.

Councillor Russell requested the opportunity to review the current ordinances with the proposed changes prior to adoption.

The City Clerk responded by stating he will comply with both requests.

Councillor Wolf moved to refer the proposed Recodification to the City Council without recommendation.

The hearing was adjourned at 7:50 p.m.

Dear Gregory:

I am happy to enclose a certified copy of the recodification vote of the Cambridge City Council adopted January 26, 1987. The Council was very pleased with the ordinance analysis to date and is looking forward to a final draft for their review. Also, I am enclosing for your review and assistance a copy of my memorandum to the City Council, essentially incorporating the discussions made between the City Solicitor, you and myself during the October 27, 1986 meeting here in Cambridge.

Although I am frankly somewhat uncertain as to the form with which you are generally comfortable in terms of a codification vote, be assured that the City Council by the enclosed action has agreed to delete the sections I have noted on the enclosed memorandum. I should note, however, that the City Council has not voted to increase the penalty for fines to the \$300. level, as recommended by you in proposed Section 1.24.

Also, the City Council has decided upon not making any change relative to the projection of signs, as proposed in Section 12.08.

Other than the above-referenced actions, the City Council generally agreed with the following actions:-

Present Section 1-11 - Entitlement "General Penalty" - Proposed Section 1.24

\$50.00 ONLY This relates to the general penalty for violation of City Ordinances, currently at \$50.00 and should your Honorable Body consider favorably at this evening's meeting a current proposal to increase the penalty for fines to \$300.00; said amendment should be incorporated within the Recodification.

(REMAINS THE SAME)

Present Section 2-23 - Entitlement "Departments Generally" - Proposed Section 2.22

(LIST ENCLOSED) It is recommended here that the City Council formally vote to update the current list of departments, boards and commissions for insertion in the Recodified Ordinance.

(APPROVED) Present Section 2-59 - Entitlement "Auditing Department" - Proposed Section 2.32

It is recommended that since the Fiscal Year no longer ends on December 31st that this be changed to reflect the date of June 30th.

(APPROVED) Present Section 2-95 - Entitlement "Report of the Purchasing Agent" - Proposed Section 2-34 & 2-34.2

It is recommended here, again that we refer to the proper Fiscal Year, that of July 1st - June 30th.

(APPROVED) Present Section 2-104 - Entitlement "Report of the City Treasurer" - Proposed Section 2.36

Again, it is recommended that the Fiscal Year be incorporated appropriately.

(APPROVED) Present Section 2-192 - Entitlement " Fire Department Salaries" - Proposed Section 2.40

It is recommended that this be repealed, as well as Ordinance 852, due to the fact that these salaries are no longer established by Ordinance.

(APPROVED) Present Sections 2-104 & 2-141 & 2-144 - Entitlements respectively - "Financial Year of the City Treasurer", "Bridge Department" & "Bridge Department Annual Report" - Proposed Section 2.46

It is recommended here that all these sections be changed to reflect the new Fiscal Year.

(APPROVED) Present Section 2-177 - Entitlement "Reporting Period Library Department" - Proposed Section 2.50

Again, it is recommended to change this section to reflect the new Fiscal Year.

(APPROVED) Present Section 15-13 - Entitlement "Police Department Report Period" - Proposed Section 2.56

Again, it is recommended that the proper Fiscal Year be inserted.

(APPROVED) Present Sections 17-2, 17-5 & 17-70 - Entitlements respectively - "Department of Public Works Reporting Period", "Department of Public Works Annual Report" & "Department of Public Works Report of the Superintendent" - Proposed Section 2.58

Again, it is recommended that the proper Fiscal Year be inserted.

(APPROVED) Present Ordinance No. 1007 - Entitlement "Department of Public Works" - Proposed Section 2.58

In 1984, inadvertently, Section 17-63 of the present Code was repealed and it is recommended that the repeal be rescinded.

(APPROVED) Present Section 9-33 - Entitlement "City Electrician Annual Report" - Proposed Section 2.60

Again, it is recommended that the current Fiscal Year be inserted.

(APPROVED) Present Section 2-196 - Entitlement "Officers & Employees Generally" - Proposed Section 2.62

It is recommended that since these salaries are no longer established by ordinance, that this be repealed.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 2-192 & 2-193 - Entitlements respectively "Fire Department Salaries" & "Police Department Salaries" - Proposed Section 2.66

Again, it is recommended that since these salaries are now recommended through collective bargaining that this section be repealed.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 19-8 & 19-24 - Entitlements respectively "Water Department" & "Report of the Water Board" - Proposed Section 2.74

It is recommended that both of these sections reflect the present Fiscal Year.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 7-1 through 7-33 - Entitlement "City Demonstration Agency" - Proposed Section 2.80

It is recommended that this section be repealed, since the City no longer has a City Demonstration Agency.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 2-158 through 2-168 - Entitlement "Community Schools Commission" - Proposed Section 2.92

It is recommended that this section be repealed, inasmuch as Ordinance No. 823 supersedes current Sections 2-158 through 2-168.

(APPROVED)

Present Ordinances 928 & 961 - Entitlement "Cambridge Consumer Advisory Commission" - Proposed Section 2.98

It is recommended here that Ordinance 928 be repealed, inasmuch as Ordinance 961 supersedes same.

(APPROVED)

Present Ordinances 931 & 954 - Entitlement "Energy Commission" - Proposed Section 2.100

It appears that Ordinance 954 supersedes Ordinance 931 and therefore it is recommended that Ordinance 931 be repealed.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 14-3, 14-8, 14-10 & 14-11 - Entitlements with regard to the Recreation Commission, respectively:- "Membership; appointment; terms", "Rules of Commission", "Services of City Engineer" & "Reports to City Manager" - Proposed Section 2.102

It is recommended that these sections be repealed, since the recreation activities are now under the auspices of the Department of Human Services.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 2-189 & 2-190 - Entitlements with regard to "Officers Generally", respectively:- "Estimates of Expenditures" & "Departmental Reports" - proposed Section 3.04

It is recommended that the proper Fiscal Year be inserted.

(APPROVED)

Present Section 6-1 through 6-7 - Entitlement "Employment Agencies" - Proposed Section 5.16

It is recommended that due to the fact that employment agencies are generally licensed by the Commonwealth, that this section be repealed.

(APPROVED)

Present Ordinance 836 - Entitlement "Hackney Carriages" - Proposed Section 5.20

It is recommended here that Ordinance 837 supersedes Ordinance 836, and therefore, that Ordinance 836 should be repealed.

(APPROVED)

Present Section 6-22 - Entitlement - "Peddlers" - Proposed Section 5.40

It is recommended that since this provision was declared unconstitutional fourteen years ago, it is suggested that this section be repealed and that in the present Code, Section 6-23 be amended to delete the U.S. citizen requirement, since it discriminates against aliens.

(APPROVED)

Present Ordinance 918 - Entitlement "Massage Parlors" - Proposed Ordinance 944

It is recommended here that in order to be consistent and to comply with Chapter 40, Section 21, M.G.L.A. that the maximum fine to be imposed be \$300.00 versus \$500.00 and this would be consistent with the ordinance being considered this evening.

(SEE ENCLOSED FEE SCHEDULE)

Present Section 12-7 - Entitlement "Miscellaneous Business License Fees" - Proposed Section 5.48

This should be amended to reflect new fees established by the License Commission relative to lodging houses and various other revenue producing entities.

(APPROVED)

Present Ordinance 949 - Entitlement "Security Alarm Systems" - Proposed Section 8.28

Ordinance 962 supersedes Ordinance 949, therefore it is recommended that Ordinance 949 be repealed.

\$50.00 ONLY

Present Section 12-15D - Entitlement "Junk Motor Vehicles" - Proposed Section 8.36.2

It is recommended that the fee, if desired, be increased from \$50.00 to \$100.00

(APPROVED)

Proposed Section 8.40 - Entitlement "Rent Control"

It is recommended here that an entire Section be provided for Rent Control and that in this Section, the Recodified version of the Rent Control Ordinances will appear.

(CURRENT WORDING TO REMAIN)

Present Section 13-5 - Entitlement "Offences Against Public Morals" - Proposed Section 9.08

Ordinance 933 appears to supersede Ordinance 825, therefore it is suggested that either this section be repealed or amended in the first sentence:- "Only speech which is obscene or constitutes fighting words". It is also recommended that Section 13 be repealed due to its unconstitutionality.

(REJECTED)

Present Section 13-18 - Entitlement with regard to Offenses "Penalty for Violation"

It is again recommended that the City, if it sees fit to approve the proposal for a maximum \$300.00 fine, that this section reflect same.

(REMAINS 6")

Present Section 3-1 - Entitlement with regard to Advertising "Projections over streets; permit; fee" - Proposed Section 12.08

It is recommended that the Council consider amending the six inch projection to twelve inches.

(REMAINS)

Present Section 17-41 - Entitlement "Streets & Sidewalks - Use Regulations" - Proposed Section 12.16

It is recommended that because present Code 17-41 pertains to loitering and obstructing is vague according to Massachusetts Law, it is therefore recommended that it be repealed.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 14-12 & 14-23 - Entitlement "Commons and Public Grounds"

It is recommended that these sections be repealed because this function is currently under the jurisdiction of the Department of Human Services.

(APPROVED)

Present Sections 2-142 & 2-143 - Entitlement "Bridges" - Proposed Section 2.143

It is recommended that these sections be repealed due to the fact that bridges are currently under the control of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

(APPROVED)

Present Section 17-51 - Entitlement "Water and Sewer System - Regulation and Fees" - Proposed Section 13.16

It is recommended that this Section be amended due to the fact that Ordinance 1007 has changed the water and sewer rates..

(APPROVED)

Present Section 9.33 - Entitlement "Electrical Department" - Proposed Section 15.16

It is recommended that the proper Fiscal Year be inserted.

(APPROVED)

The present City Zoning Code

Shall be incorporated by reference - proposed to be Section 17

(NO ACTION TAKEN - CURRENT SECTION TO REMAIN)

Present Sections 17-71 & 17-72 - Entitlement "Rubbish, Garbage and Litter" - Proposed Section 8.20.

It is recommended that the City Council discuss whether or not a fee is appropriate for the collection of rubbish in order to be included in the Recodification.

I realize this is a comprehensive memorandum and is far from perfect, but I believe it properly outlines the proposed changes in the City Code, which has not received such revision since 1972.

Thank you for your attention and cooperation in this matter.


Finally, I am forwarding to you for incorporation in the final draft, a current department head, board and commission list, as well as the most recently enacted amendment relative to spray paints, calling for a fine of \$300.

One final comment about the actual recodification process: the City Council inquired as to the deletion of outdated sections, for example, present code Section 2-126 I do not see referenced in your ordinance analysis. That position is no longer in effect but I assume will be deleted by you upon receipt of the enclosed department head ordinance.

Another example of the Council's concern is present code Section 13-14 entitled "Curfew". I do not see any reference to this section and question whether this is even legal.

I hope these documents will be beneficial to the continuation of the recodification. Please feel free to contact me with any questions.

Subject Proposed Recodification of the General Ordinances

As you are aware, pursuant to your instructions and with the cooperation of the City Manager and City Solicitor, I have been working with the Book Publishing Company in an effort to complete a Recodification of the General Ordinances.

As part of this process, the City Solicitor and myself met with a representative of Book Publishing Company to review the ordinance analysis conducted by the Book Publishing Company. This meeting took place on October 29, 1986 and a complete review of the current ordinances was conducted identifying inconsistencies, technical errors and duplication.

As part of the recodification, the Book Publishing Company has requested a formal vote of the City Council relative to text changes which need to be made prior to publication. In order that the Recodification may go forward as expeditiously as possible, a cut-off date of January 31, 1987 has been made for a vote of the City Council.

Other than items which can clearly be corrected editorially, such as reference sections and title pages, I believe it is important for the Council to review those items which require amendment. These items, as identified at the meeting of October 29th are now forwarded to you for final review.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Two entitled "Administration", Article XXII entitled "Officers Generally", Section 2-191 entitled "List of Salaries in General": is hereby amended by striking out in said Section 2-191 the salaries of the positions listed below and substituting in place thereof the following new schedule of salaries.

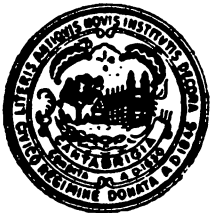

At least two signs shall be posted on all public buildings with not less than one inch letters, not more than 10 feet, and not less than 6 feet from the ground, black letters on white background as follows:

Sec. 13-21. Sale of Certain Paints and Markers

No person shall, within the City, sell, display, expose or keep for sale any aerosol spray paint can, or any marker containing a fluid which is not watersoluble and which has a point, brush, applicator or other writing surface in excess of one-half inch, unless at the point of display or sale there is posted a sign with letters not less than one and one-half inches in height bearing the following words:

"SALE OF SPRAY PAINT AND BROAD INDELIBLE MARKERS TO PERSONS UNDER EIGHTEEN AND THE UNLAWFUL PURCHASE OR POSSESSION OF PAINTS AND SUCH MARKERS BY PERSONS UNDER EIGHTEEN IS PUNISHABLE BY A THREE HUNDRED DOLLAR FINE."

nor shall any person sell or deliver any aerosol spray paint, or any marker containing a fluid which is not watersoluble and which has a point, brush, applicator or other writing surface in excess of one-half inch to any person under eighteen years of age or to any person of whatever age who refuses to submit for inspection if requested a driver's license, liquor purchase identification or other identification to establish the age of such person, nor shall any person being under the age of eighteen purchase, conceal, or remove from the premises such items, providing that nothing herein shall prevent the parent, guardian, employer, or teach of such a minor person from delivering such items to a minor intending the same to be lawfully used.
