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Zaire forces fire on marchers

BRAZZAVILLE, Congo — Security forces in Zaire fired on pro-democracy demonstrators yesterday during a church-led march that the government said was an illegal attempt by subversive priests to bring down President Mobutu Sese Seko.

There were conflicting reports on the number of casualties. Radio France International quoted Zaire's communications minister as saying 13 people were killed.

Zaire's state TV reported two deaths, describing them as

demonstrators killed when they attacked police with knives. The opposition Christian Democrats said at least six demonstrators were killed and the party's leader, Joseph Ileo, was beaten up.

The TV, monitored across the Congo River in the capital of neighboring Congo, said two Belgian priests had been arrested during the march and would be expelled.

It called the march illegal and said demonstrators had faced the "full rigor" of the law.

The statement, which the television said was issued by the Interior Ministry, added: "This demonstration is the result of the action of some priests longing for political activities and subversion."

Marchers called for the reopening of the country's national conference on democra-

cy, suspended by Mobutu in January after opposition delegates appeared to have won control of it. National conferences have been used in some other African nations to wrest control of power from authoritarian leaders like Mobutu.

Many workers in key government-controlled sectors of the economy have gone on strike in support of a resumption of the conference.

Mobutu's prime minister, Nguza Karl-i-Bond, suspended it on grounds it was costing too much and was getting out of control. Opposition and church leaders said the conference was suspended because opposition delegates had won control of it.

Mobutu's main former foreign allies, the United States, France and former colonial ruler Belgium, have protested the suspension and said there can be no new aid for the bankrupt Central African nation until the conference reopens.

Key trade talks open in Dallas

DALLAS — Plans by Canada, Mexico and the United States to remove barriers in their trade will bog down unless negotiators make significant progress in talks this week in Dallas, delegation sources said yesterday.

A five-day meeting, beginning today, brings together the chief negotiators for their first face-to-face talks over the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Sources close to the negotiations said progress made in the talks will determine whether the agreement will be completed and presented to the U.S. Congress this spring or stalled until next year.

"It is a question of momentum," said one source in the Mexican delegation, which arrived in Dallas yesterday.

A source in the U.S. delegation told Reuters that despite pressure to open the talks to the public.

"We will not allow this to be negotiated in the press."

"Take away the headlines and you take away the political posturing," the U.S. source said. "Then you can get progress."

As a result, the only public appearances expected for the negotiators during the week is a tentatively scheduled news briefing today and a dinner Wednesday.

The chief negotiators are Julius Katz for the United States, John Weekes for Canada and Herminio Blanco Mendoza for Mexico.

Working groups are wrestling with specific details, such as the 28,000 items now subject to tariffs in trade between the United States and Mexico.

ters' decision to build their new convent here a "bold move" that created one of the largest infusions of private investment money to the neighborhood during 1990-91.

"It's important a group of 70-year-old sisters feel comfortable living in Roxbury," he said. "Cab drivers don't even like to go up there."

The sisters never worried during the time-consuming permit process, he said. "They prayed for everything from permits to construction dates," he said.

Now Mother Adele Marie looks out her office window and is reminded of British scholar and liturgist, John Mason Neale.

Scanning the Sussex landscape, Neale grew concerned for the cottage dwellers living in rural poverty and disease and founded the Society of St.

Margaret in 1855 to serve them.

"Since we've been here, I've looked out this window and I've thought of him looking out his study window," explained Mother Adele Marie. "I've sort of looked out at these houses here and realized there is a lot for us to do."

Already sisters have become involved in tutoring children in the community, running a parish food cupboard and serving on various local church staffs. The convent also has an infirmary for ill, convalescing or aged sisters in an order where more than half of its 43 sisters are over 70 years old.

"We're not committed to any particular form of ministry. As a religious order, our concern is to administer to the poor and the needy, but we don't have to do it as nurses or teachers. That allows us to change our work with the times," she said.

The sisters were invited to America in 1873 to run Children's Hospital in Boston. They came to Roxbury in 1904, when they bought the historic William Lloyd Garrison House. Then they moved St. Monica's Nursing Home, where they cared for tubercular patients — mainly black women and children who were denied admittance to hospitals.

"We had a fantastic ministry on Beacon Hill," said Sister Frances Adele.

"But everything seemed to fall into place for us to move from there to here as if this was God's will," added Sister Frances Adele, who tutors neighborhood children at the Nathan Hale school, the St. John-St. James after-school program and "church school" at St. Stephen's in the South End.

Sister Janet, 94, the former physician at St. Monica's, is pleased with the changes.

"I am delighted about the convent," she said in a note. "I think it is wonderful — much more adequate than St. Monica's, much as we loved her."

The Roxbury convent is the new mother house for the American order of the society, which has mission houses in Haiti, New York City, upstate New York and several other East Coast sites.

The new convent was financed in part by the sale of one of the order's Louisburg Square buildings, fund drives and private donations, Mother Adele Marie said.

Sale of the Louisburg Square Convent has been stilled by the recessionary economy, she said. One building is under a sales agreement and three others still on the market. This, in turn, has forced the sisters to downscale the Roxbury development, leaving two buildings untouched for the time being.

A memorial service will be held today for Marshall W.S. Swan of Rockport, a foreign service officer who died Feb. 6 in Australia. He was 74.

A longtime resident of Rockport, Mr. Swan attended Milton public schools. He received a bachelor of arts degree from Harvard University in 1939, a master's degree in 1941 and a doctorate in 1942.

Upon receiving his doctorate, Mr. Swan worked as an assistant professor of English at Tufts University until 1946. He then worked in Philadelphia as the director and curator of the American Swedish Historical Foundation and Museum.

Mr. Swan joined the U.S. Information Service in 1949. He worked as a cultural attache in the Netherlands from 1951-1955, a public affairs officer in Milan, Italy, from 1955-1957 and a cultural attache in Rome Italy from 1957-1958. He worked as again as a public affairs officer in Oslo, Norway, from 1958 to 1963.

In 1963 he became assistant chief of training for the U.S. Information Service and a member of the Foreign Service's joint board of examiners.

He returned to his work in

public affairs in Stockholm, Sweden, and Bujumbura, Burundi, between 1966 and 1973. In 1973 he moved to Washington to work as a cultural advisor and retired from the Information Service in 1977.

Mr. Swan was a past president of the Essex County Historical Association, a board member of the Essex Institute Library and a member of the Cape Ann Historical Association.

He was the curator and past president of the Sandy Bay Historical Society, a member of the Rockport Rotary Club and a proprietor of the Boston Antheneum.

Mr. Swan was a member of the Harvard Faculty Club, the Harvard Club of Boston and an executive trustee of the Harvard Glee Club Foundation.

He is survived by his wife, Constance (Tocher); a son, Geoffrey M. Redmond of Washington; a daughter, Ingrid C. Brown of Rockport; two aunts; and four grandchildren.
