WHEREAS: The life of MARY B. NEWMAN, guided by principles of her strong Quaker faith, has been exemplary of this commitment to excellence in public service in the City of Cambridge, where she served as a Sate Representative for some fifteen years, displaying a rare commitment to the people and issues of our City; and

WHEREAS: MARY B. NEWMAN has certainly had an exemplary and effective career beyond her experience as an elected official, serving as a state Cabinet member when in 1970 Governor Sargent appointed her Sectary of Manpower Affairs, and later serving our nation and its people at the Federal level, when President Ford named her regional director of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare; and

WHEREAS: In 1997, MARY B. NEWMAN began what is perhaps one of her greatest contributions as a public servant, teaching at the University of Massachusetts at Boston as a distinguished lecturer in management; and

WHEREAS: To those who know her, MARY B. NEWMAN is "a woman with limitless energy and compassion," who performed magnificent work both social and charitable causes, above and beyond the call of duty; and

WHEREAS: In recognition and appreciation of her many exceptional achievements in the area of public service during her lifetime, The John W. McCormack Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Massachusetts at Boston has awarded MARY B. NEWMAN the John Joseph Moakley Award for Distinguished Public Service, presented each year to "a dedicated leader who has made significant contributions to the welfare of our state and our nation;" now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council, on behalf of all of the residents whom she served so faithfully and well for fifteen years, do hereby thank MARY B.
