RESOLVED: That the City of Cambridge gratefully accepts this generous gift; and be it further

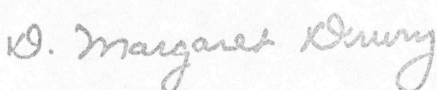
RESOLVED: That the City of Cambridge thanks the reticent philanthropist for his gentle act of good will and the inspiration derived by all from his largesse.
