- RESOLVED: that, I, Alfred E. Vellucci, Mayor of the City of Cambridge, Massachusetts, hereby proclaim the week of April 18 thru April 24, 1982 as National YWCA Week and urge our citizens to join me in this celebration of the YWCA and the many achievements of its adult and teen membership.
