

Local firms gear up for right to know

include 1600 substances. Mixtures of the substances also fall under the law's provisions.

Though implementation of the law is several weeks away, local businesses have already started preparing for the extensive record-keeping it will entail.

"It's not been as much of a struggle as we thought it would be," says Margaret Boothe, the plant chemist for the Dodge Chemical Co.

She says the 44-employee firm, which manufactures embalming chemicals, is in the process of collecting MSDSs from suppliers, labelling substances, and instructing employees about the law.

"It means someone in a small company will have to wear a bigger hat," says Arthur Jacobson, plant manager for Irving B. Moore Inc.

The law, he adds, will create more responsibility for a company employee and will mean more costs in time and money.

Nevertheless, he says the 100-employee firm, which manufactures and distributes industrial rubber products, is doing what is required to comply with the law.

For Blue Bell Plastics, a 15-employee distributor of plastic products, the coming of the law is not intimidating.

"I don't anticipate any problems," says Tom Roche, a sales representative with the company. He points to the Right to Know law in Rhode Island that Blue Bell has had to comply with already.

Roche explains that the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requires employers to obtain records on substances from manufacturers, and he notes that the process is a simple one.

An estimated 225 businesses in Cambridge will be affected, according to Kevin Doherty. The Cambridge Chamber of Commerce, meanwhile, puts the figure at 235.

Some firms will be able to apply for exemptions from the law for research laboratory or trade secrecy purposes, while other firms are likely to find that the law is not too stifling at all. Many firms already have internal programs to inform and train employees, and the law will just be in support of such efforts.

At Polaroid Corp., an internal Right to Know policy is already established, with information available for employees and labels on containers, says Harry Fatkin, the firm's director of health, safety, and environmental affairs.

"Our policy is for people to know what we're working with," Fatkin explains. "Our compliance with the law would just be consistent with that policy."

Polaroid's major concern with the law initially was the possible disclosure of trade secrets, yet Fatkin says the law and OSHA regulations adequately protect a firm's proprietary information.

The company, which has various facilities within the city, is not likely to seek a research laboratory exemption, he says, though it has until September to decide.

The research laboratory exemption applies to work areas where testing of hazardous materials is taking place, but not for "the production or manufacture of goods for direct commercial sale."

The rationale for the exemption involves lab personnel who generally understand the materials they are working with and know the risks involved.

Arthur D. Little Inc., which has been testing nerve gas at its Acorn Park facilities for the US Department of Defense, will be seeking a research laboratory exemption for part of its operations.

Scott Stricoff, the international con-

sulting firm's corporate manager and chief consultant on occupational health and safety, says ADL will comply with the law for its printing and painting services on its North Cambridge campus.

With research, however, he explains that the firm already supplies personnel with information.

"We've always tended to try to alert people about hazards," Stricoff says, "and we expect to continue to do that."

Community residents and the Cambridge City Council have expressed reservations about ADL's nerve gas testing, and, under the Right to Know law, there are provisions for residents to find out more about chemical testing in the areas where they live. Currently, the nerve gas testing imbroglio between ADL and the city is in court.

Another Cambridge firm which will be affected by the law, and which has had its own controversies to deal with concerning toxic materials, is W.R. Grace and Co., a major chemical manufacturer.

As a manufacturer, Grace not only must supply its own employees with information but must also provide data to its customers.

What's more, since the firm produces chemicals for use all over the country, it must abide by not only Massachusetts law and OSHA regulations, but the Right to Know laws of other states, as well.

"It's hard (to comply) when the regulations differ from state to state," says Mark Stoler, a Grace attorney for environmental and safety issues. "We are reviewing those other laws and trying to comply with them."

He notes, for instance, that the Right to Know law here is more detailed than the one in California, which was established in 1980.

Manufacturers want OSHA communication rules to pre-empt state Right to Know laws, claiming that a uniform law would make compliance easier.

"The OSHA standard does a good job protecting employees," says Randal Johnson, a spokesman for the National Association of Manufacturers.

He explains that OSHA already requires manufacturers to include information with the products they send to customers, and a case is now before the Third Circuit Court in Philadelphia challenging some state Right to Know laws.

But not all industry and business groups are opposed to state Right to Know laws. In fact, in Massachusetts, the Right to Know law is something that the business community helped shape.

"We're satisfied with it," says William J. McCarthy, the general counsel for the 2600-member Associated Industries of Massachusetts. "It's workable and achievable."

The group has sponsored about ten seminars for its members and others on the implementation of the law, he adds.

While no business likes additional regulation, McCarthy says, the public's concerns about the use of hazardous material has created an issue that the business community must address.

"Initially, we were against it," says David Hughes, executive director of the Cambridge Chamber of Commerce. "There was a strong feeling that it would restrict business to a degree. But if we're going to have it, at least we've worked out the best compromise possible."

It took eight months of negotiations between labor and business leaders, with Gov. Michael Dukakis as the mediator, to forge a law that addressed the interests of both sides. Dukakis signed the measure into law last November, and regulations were promulgated in June.

Amid the law's conditions, municipal governments have a curious role. After all,

the governments must help enforce the law but at the same time, they, too, must abide by its letter.

Although informational in nature, the law does carry criminal penalties. For incorrect implementation, businesses face the chance for conciliation or the possibility of a maximum fine of \$250 for every day of non-compliance. For "willful" or intentional non-implementation, the maximum fines are \$500 a day for a first offense and/or 30 days in jail, and \$1000 a day and/or 90 days in jail for subsequent offenses.

The City of Cambridge is also an employer, and Healy says the city's public works, water, traffic, and cemetery departments are likely to be affected by the Right to Know law. He adds that the city-run Neville Manor Nursing Home and Cambridge Hospital will probably be the largest departments which must comply.

The city manager notes that the city's purchasing agent will have to make a request for MSDS information part of the bid specifications for city contracts.

Moreover, the city and the municipal coordinator must file MSDSs from Cambridge firms and serve as the first contact that community residents have with the Right to Know process. The latter provision, however, does not take effect until April 1.

"This (law) seems like it will lend itself to some type of automation," Healy says. Fortunately, he notes, there is state money available if automation is necessary.

"I think there will be a lot of problems implementing the law," he says. "But I think we're in reasonable shape for implementation."

Yet the Right to Know law in Cambridge may have some additions to it.

Chalfen, at the city council's request,

has proposed an ordinance that the city's law department is preparing for the council's Aug. 15 meeting.

According to a report by the health commissioner, the ordinance would "provide for the identification of hazardous materials; initiate a permit system; provide for proper monitoring services; and provide for the adequate supervision of storage, use, and transportation of hazardous materials..."

The ordinance would also aid the city in its desire for a "comprehensive emergency response ability, particularly in relation to fires involving toxic materials."

Chalfen and the city council have become interested in the use of hazardous materials in Cambridge, namely because of ADL's nerve gas testing and the dumping of toxic waste in an MIT dumpster.

A Scientific Advisory Committee has been convened, and it will issue a report on the ADL situation soon. The body also has been studying, in general, the use of hazardous materials in the city.

With the state Right to Know law and the proposed ordinance to supplement it, Cambridge is seeking to abort any chance of a Times Beach, Love Canal, or Woburn situation happening. Chalfen, in his report, makes reference to those environmental disasters, which were created by the improper use and disposal of hazardous materials.

Through cooperation among city health agencies and advisory groups, Chalfen believes more information and education about toxic substances will result.

Such cooperation, his report reads, can lead to "a process of advance consideration of the use of materials of concern and allow for the continuous flow of information and action necessary for the management of constantly changing inventories of toxic materials in the city."

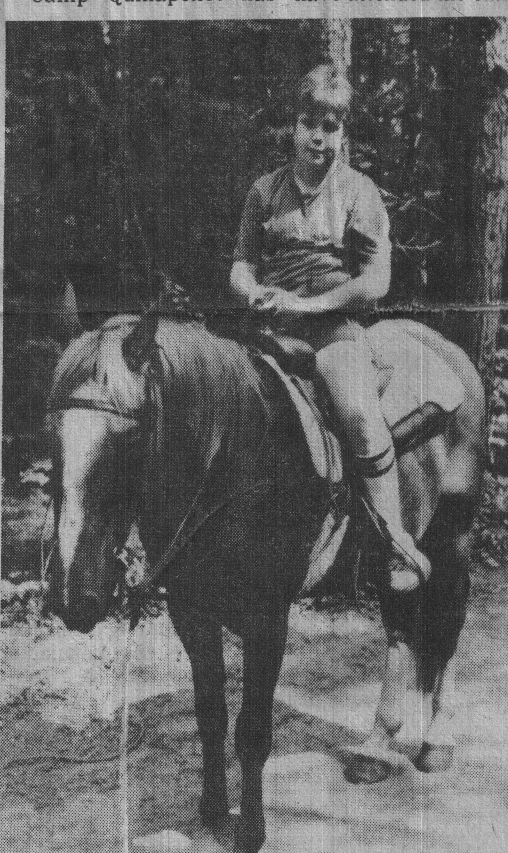
Scout camp gets top rating

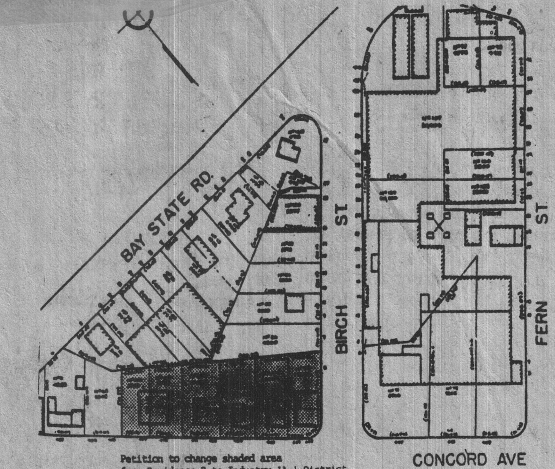
