For the purpose of solving the homeless problem, Each city must have a way of fulfilling its responsibility for that purpose.

Be it ordered:

That in one week's time, those or that government agency which is responsible for homeless matters develop a formula for determining what the homeless housing number for the city of Cambridge should be.

Elements such as a city's financial condition, land available for homeless housing, land necessary for city-wide open space and etc. may be of use in calculation.

Once this formula is developed let the city immediately take steps to develop the housing which the formula has indicated it should be responsible for.

After this procedure has been set and perfected, let the City Council send a letter to every city in Metro Boston (to) asking them to "join in" in the use of this formula and the fulfillment of their responsibility.

Also, let this letter ask the "city wide communication network" be established so that when a city's homeless housing capacity can hold no more, it may contact cities which have available housing to send people their minimum requirements for a housing unit.

FOR THE PURPOSE OF SOLVING THE HOMELESS PROBLEM

EACH CITY MUST HAVE A WAY OF FULFILLING ITS RESPONSIBILITY FOR THAT PURPOSE

ORDERED: That in one week's time, those or that government agency which is responsible for homeless matters develop a formula for determining what the homeless housing number for the City of Cambridge should be.

Elements such as a City's financial condition, land available for homeless housing, land necessary for City-wide open space and etc., may be of use in calculation.

Once this formula is developed, let the City immediately take steps to implement said formula.

Once this procedure has been perfected, the City Council should send a letter to every City in the Metro Boston Area asking them to "join in", and adopt this formula in an effort to fulfill their responsibility.

Furthermore, let this letter serve as the basis for a "City-wide communication network" so that when a City's homeless housing capacity can hold no more, the "network" may contact cities which may have available housing which the homeless could occupy.

The minimum housing requirements for these individuals should be:

1. A private room with conditions allowing for peace and quiet, so the individuals can have peace of mind to think and begin to straighten out their lives.
2. One ceiling light.
3. Adequate heat.
4. Adequate ventilation.
5. A sofa which can turn into bed.

6. A simple desk with a desk, chair lamp.
7. One comfortable big easy chair.
8. Two floor outlets.
9. A closet for clothes.
10. Available toilet & bath facility.
11. One dresser.

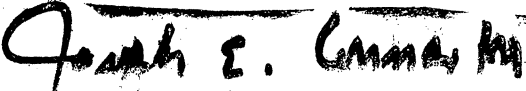
