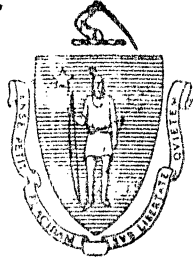
NEW PROGRAMS

The seriousness of DOC's overcrowding problem necessitates the recommendation of \$7,824,803 funding for new programs and services which are directed toward: expanding bed capacity improving the operations of DOC facilities, and improving programming for inmates. The items include:

1. \$6,413,009 for the expansion of bed capacity.
 - a. \$1,884,186 to open a 160 bed medium security facility at Gardner, Massachusetts, effective July 1, 1981.
 - b. \$2,643,800 to establish a 123 bed reception and classification unit at the East Cambridge Jail, effective October 1, 1981.
 - c. \$1,474,023 to establish a 160 bed medium security facility on the site of a former air force base, effective January 1, 1982.
 - d. \$411,000 to provide reimbursement to the counties for housing state inmates. This was calculated at a rate of \$15 per day for 150 inmates.
2. \$544,763 for 79 new positions to improve inmate programs, centralize transportation, improve maintenance and training. Also included are 39 new correction officer positions for improved security.
3. \$217,580 for an increase in inmate wages in all facilities. This will raise the pay rate from \$.60, \$1.00 and \$1.50 a day to \$1.00, \$1.50 and \$2.00 a day.
4. \$100,739 for new equipment, clothing, farm supplies, and repairs.
5. \$467,500 to contract for Boston State PRC.--55 beds.
6. \$81,212 for consultant services.

Revenue

In FY 82 an estimated \$386.3 million in revenues generated from reimbursement on rentals, sale and meals. New revenue initiatives will total to an additional \$460,849. Sales from industrial products manufactured by the Industries Program will generate an estimated \$2,046,000 in restricted revenues. Included in this projection is \$500,000 of restricted revenue resulting from the sale of auto plates to the Department of Public Safety. This is one step in a plan to promote prison industry self-sufficiency.

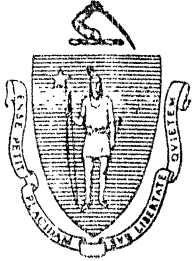

The seriousness of DOC's overcrowding problem necessitates the recommendation of \$7,824,803 funding for new programs and services which are directed toward: expanding bed capacity improving the operations of DOC facilities, and improving programming for inmates. The items include:

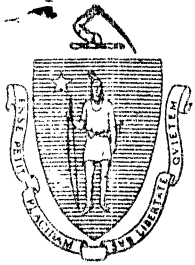

NEW PROGRAMS

The seriousness of DOC's overcrowding problem necessitates the recommendation of \$7,824,803 funding for new programs and services which are directed toward: expanding bed capacity improving the operations of DOC facilities, and improving programming for inmates. The items include:

1. \$6,413,009 for the expansion of bed capacity.
 - a. \$1,884,186 to open a 160 bed medium security facility at Gardner, Massachusetts, effective July 1, 1981.
 - b. \$2,643,800 to establish a 123 bed reception and classification unit at the East Cambridge Jail, effective October 1, 1981.
 - c. \$1,474,023 to establish a 160 bed medium security facility on the site of a former air force base, effective January 1, 1982.
 - d. \$411,000 to provide reimbursement to the counties for housing state inmates. This was calculated at a rate of \$15 per day for 150 inmates.
2. \$544,763 for 79 new positions to improve inmate programs, centralize transportation, improve maintenance and training. Also included are 39 new correction officer positions for improved security.
3. \$217,580 for an increase in inmate wages in all facilities. This will raise the pay rate from \$.60, \$1.00 and \$1.50 a day to \$1.00, \$1.50 and \$2.00 a day.
4. \$100,739 for new equipment, clothing, farm supplies, and repairs.
5. \$467,500 to contract for Boston State PRC.--55 beds.
6. \$81,212 for consultant services.

Revenue

In FY 82 an estimated \$386.3 million in revenues generated from reimbursement on rentals, sale and meals. New revenue initiatives will total to an additional \$460,849. Sales from industrial products manufactured by the Industries Program will generate an estimated \$2,046,000 in restricted revenues. Included in this projection is \$500,000 of restricted revenue resulting from the sale of auto plates to the Department of Public Safety. This is one step in a plan to promote prison industry self-sufficiency.
