P R O C L A M A T I O N

Whereas, this Spring marks the Forty-Second Anniversary of the end of World War II, in which fifty million people died; and

Whereas, though we are not now at war, there are enough nuclear missiles in the world to re-deliver the Holocaust ten times over, to each man, woman, and child; and

Whereas, it appears through recent international developments that increasing numbers of persons are being enabled to choose freely where on this earth they shall live; and

Whereas, discussions at this time are proceeding between our country and the Soviet Union, as are student and professional exchanges of many kinds, and while some twenty American Congressional delegates are there visiting, seeking whether it be possible to reduce the threat of nuclear war without impairing national defense; and,

Whereas a goodwill mission of some twenty Soviet citizens will be visiting Cambridge on Good Friday, April 16, 1987, to exchange peaceful wishes of acquaintance in friendship with our citizens;

N O W T H E R E F O R E:

Be it resolved, that this Council takes this opportunity to welcome the Soviet goodwill mission to Cambridge; and

Be it further resolved, that this Council urges our citizens to extend every courtesy to these visitors, that they may return with memories of our commitment to peace and to constructive cooperation; and

Be it further resolved, that it is the belief of this Council that such missions, discussions, and exchanges, between our countries and among our respective citizens, can lead to greater cooperation in space, in arms reduction, in environmental protection, and in other areas of public importance, in the spirit with which we cooperated to the defeat of Naziism in 1941-45.
