

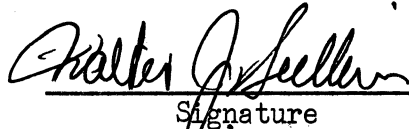

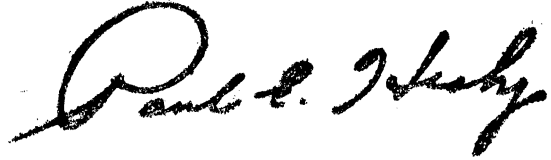

IN CITY COUNCIL
August 4, 1980**RESOLVED:**

We the members of the Cambridge City Council in conjunction with the members of the City Council of Madison, Wisconsin, and members of the Board of Supervisors of the city and county of San Francisco, do hereby express our solidarity with the citizens of the City of Berkeley who on June 3, 1980 joined with our two cities in their overwhelming vote in opposition to increasing military spending.

When in November 1978, 61% of San Francisco's voters demanded jobs with peace by cutting military budget, the Federal government did not listen - military spending increased to \$115 billion dollars.

When in April 1979, citizens in Madison voted for the same, by an even larger margin - military spending increased to \$126 billion dollars.

As the 1980-81 Federal budget now calls for the largest military expenditures in our history - over \$150 billion dollars, as the Pentagon has called for more than a trillion dollars for military purposes over the next five years, as our cities starve for the jobs and social programs they so desperately need, and as our world edges closer to a nuclear war, let it be known that we will no longer accept this threat to our lives, our world, our communities - this threat to the well-being of our nation, and that the demand for the reduction of military expenditures and the creation of needed jobs and services must be raised by people in increasing numbers of cities until the Federal government will listen.

We are therefore urging all concerned citizens to join with people in Detroit, Boston, Oakland CA, Flint MI, Rock Island IL, Sacramento, Hayward CA, and other cities in a national movement for Jobs for Peace.

Furthermore, we are asking City Councils and Board of Supervisors throughout the country to provide this opportunity by placing Jobs with Peace Initiatives on their November 1980 ballots.

We are calling for the debate over Federal priorities to ring out in every community, and Jobs with Peace Initiatives provide this opportunity.

We are saying that every citizen has the right to tell the Federal government how they want their tax money spent, and Jobs with Peace Initiatives assert this right.

And until Federal priorities are dramatically reserved, our commitment to building a movement for Jobs with Peace will grow even stronger.
