WHEREAS: The Third Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Convocation, sponsored by the Cambridge Black Pastors' Conference, will be held on Sunday, January 20, at 6 p.m. at St. Paul A.M.E. Church, here in Cambridge; and

WHEREAS: The Speaker at this convocation will be the distinguished Bishop Alfred E. White, Presiding Bishop of the 10th Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church; and

WHEREAS: The program will include the Cambridge Mass Choir, comprised of choir members from the 14 congregations and seven denominations of the Black Pastors' Conference; and

WHEREAS: Across this nation on this day, people will be gathered together to celebrate the 61st anniversary of the birth of the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., a day which is now a national holiday; and

WHEREAS: A people capable of producing a man of Reverend King's qualities has no need for fears, apologies or doubts; and

WHEREAS: All Americans are indebted to Reverend King for bringing us the gifts of vision and truth; for reminding us of the persistence of hope; and for giving his life in the struggle for equality, social justice, and peace; and

WHEREAS: We now find ourselves once again facing the catastrophe of war, the words of Reverend King to his beloved nation over twenty years ago, have particular meaning:

"This way of settling differences is not just...this cannot be reconciled with wisdom, justice, and love;"; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the City Council offer its warmest congratulations to the members of the Cambridge Black Pastors' Conference, and Bishop White, on the occasion of this convocation, and join with Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. in his call for "a world-wide fellowship that lifts neighborly concern beyond one's tribe, race, class, and nation...a call for an all-embracing and unconditional love for all humanity;" and be it further

RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to prepare a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution for presentation to the Cambridge Black Pastors' Conference.
