David W. Bailey, 'scholar-scribe' for Boston Transcript, Harvard

David Washburn Bailey of Cambridge, a "scholar-scribe" who was a reporter and drama critic for The Boston Transcript newspaper and secretary to the Harvard board of overseers, died Thursday in his Cambridge home. He was 98.

Mr. Bailey was born in Quincy. He graduated from Harvard College in 1921.

While an undergraduate, he worked as a reporter and sports correspondent for the Transcript. He joined its staff upon graduation. In 1922, he replaced Brooks Atkinson as assistant dramatic editor, reviewing plays and movies until joining the Harvard staff in 1928 as publications agent for the school. His duties at Harvard included preparing more than 2,000 diplomas each year and publishing official registers, university catalogs, the University Gazette, and the alumni directory.

In 1943, he was made secretary to the Harvard Corporation and secretary of the board of overseers. He remained in those posts until retiring in 1965.

When Harvard awarded him an honorary doctor of humane letters degree in 1966, the citation read: "Scholar-scribe, devoted to precision, precedent and propriety; long-time generous and helpful officer of this university."

of his class, published in 1971, he wrote, "Despite my retirement six years ago, life for me still centers around Cambridge. Unlike professors, over-age administrators are not entitled to 'emeritus' status, but the corporation was indulgent enough to vote me honorary keeper of records — a gesture that has permitted me to retain my stack-pass for the college library, house privileges at the faculty club and tickets to football games. I continue to haunt Widener but tend to prefer my wife's board to any club table. Spectator football, like tobacco, I gave up long ago."

Mr. Bailey leaves his wife, the former Joyce W. (Brown); and a son, Charles, and daughter, Joanne Hodgman, by his first wife, Catherine (Smith) Bailey, who died in 1960.

Funeral arrangements are private. A memorial service is being planned.

Howell T. Yancey Jr.

Postal Service supervisor; at 55

Howell Theodore Yancey Jr. of Brockton, a supervisor for the US Postal Service, died Wednesday, apparently of a heart attack, in Brockton Hospital. He was 55.

He was the brother of Boston City Councilor Charles C. Yancey.

Helen Wills Moody, 92

Winner of eight Wimbledon titles

CARMEL, Calif. — Tennis great Helen Wills Moody, who won eight Wimbledon titles and was one of the premier figures in America's golden era of sports in the 1920s and 1930s, died Thursday. She was 92.

Known in recent years as Helen Wills Moody Roark, she was dubbed "Little Miss Poker Face" and "Queen Helen" as she won 31 major titles, including seven at Forest Hills and four in Paris.

She was known for hitting the ball harder than any woman she faced, and her trademark white eyeshade became an enduring tennis fad.

She won her first US women's tournament in 1923, and retired after winning the 1938 Wimbledon. She was 18-2 in singles matches at the Wightman Cup, a women's team event between Britain and the United States.

She played a power game, slamming both forehand and backhand shots the full length of the court. Her serious demeanor led to her "poker face" nickname.

Born in Centerville in Alameda County, the daughter of a surgeon, she learned the game without ever taking a lesson, picking it up from watching players at the Berkeley Tennis Club.

"Children are great imitators," she said in a 1984 interview.

One year after she started playing at age 14, she won the first of her two girls national titles. She was 17
