

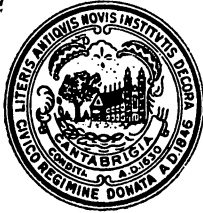

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled: "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge."

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter 2, entitled: "Administration" is hereby amended by striking out in Article XX the following sections 2-169 through 2-171 and substituting in place thereof a new Article XX entitled: "Council on Aging" which reads as follows:-

Section 2-169. Membership, Appointment and Term; Officers and Meeting.

The Council shall consist of eleven members who shall be appointed by the City Manager, seven over the age of sixty years who shall serve terms of three years each and be representative of Cambridge elderly geographical, economic and ethnic factors, and four who shall serve terms of two years each and be representative of other community segments servicing or concerned with the well being of the elderly population of Cambridge. Names of candidates to fill vacancies will be submitted by the Council to the City Manager.

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Section 2-170. Establishment and Function.

It shall be the function of the Council to:-

1. Evaluate, coordinate, promote and encourage new and existing services and activities intended to enhance or improve the quality of life of older persons in the City of Cambridge.
2. Survey resources available to Cambridge elderly and act as an information and referral source regarding services, benefits, activities and programs available to them.
3. Act in an advisory capacity to the City Manager on all matters pertaining to the welfare of elder Cambridge citizens.

4. Be the primary public advocate for elderly Cambridge residents.

Section 2-171. Duties and Responsibilities.

It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Council to:-

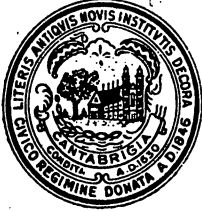
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 10. Cooperate with the State Department of Elder Affairs and Area Agency on Aging.

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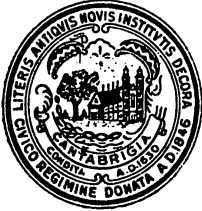

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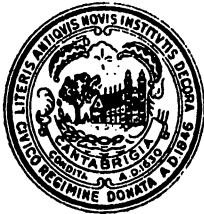

Proposed Revision of the Council on Aging Ordinance

ESTABLISHMENT AND FUNCTION

Accepting the provisions of General Laws and all sections therein; Acts 7
1956
Chp. 495, 6, 7
& Chp. 184
1966
There is hereby established a Council on Aging under the
jurisdiction of the City Manager. It shall be the function of
the Council to:

- a - evaluate, coordinate, promote and encourage new and existing services and activities intended to enhance or improve the quality of life of older persons in the city of Cambridge;
- b - survey resources available to Cambridge elderly and act as an information and referral source regarding services, benefits, activities and programs available to them;
- c - act in an advisory capacity to the City Manager on all matters pertaining to the welfare of elder Cambridge citizens;
- d - be the primary public advocate for elderly Cambridge residents;

MEMBERSHIP: APPOINTMENT AND TERMS

The Council shall consist of 11 members who shall be appointed by the City Manager, 7 over the age of 60 years who shall serve terms of 3 years each and be representative of Cambridge elderly geographical, economic, and ethnic factors, and 4 who shall serve terms of 2 years each and be representative of other community segments servicing or concerned with the well being of the elderly population of Cambridge. Names of candidates to fill vacancies will be submitted by the Council to the City Manager.

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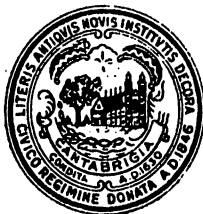

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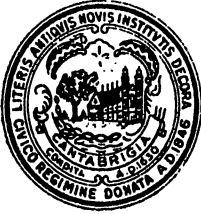
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9. Submit an annual report to the City Manager and to the State Department of Elderly Affairs on its activities of the prior year, including a record of attendance and remaining length of term of each member.


In City Council September 8, 1975


