of City Solicitor.

Sept. 29th 1886.

To the ^{re}Honorable the Board of Mayor and
Aldermen of the City of Cambridge

In reply to the question
concerning the removal of dead trees
I have the honor to say that in my
opinion nothing contained in Chapter
123 of the acts of 1885 will prevent the
surveyors of highways without first giving
public notice, and hearing from removing
without delay dead trees which in
the Judgement of said surveyors
obstruct the streets of the city or en-
danger public safety.

In Board of Aldermen, Sept. 22^d 1886.

Ordered.

That the Superintendent of Streets be authorized and directed to cause the removal of all dead trees standing upon the sidewalks in the public street of this city. The expense thereof to be charged to the appropriation for Shade Tree and Public Grounds.

Reference to the City Solicitor for his opinion upon the question whether a "dead tree" is such a tree as can be cut down and removed only after public notice and hearing, as provided in the second section of Chapter 123 of the Acts of 1885.
