WHEREAS: Mother's Day is a time not only to honor mothers, but also to reflect on the future their children face; and

WHEREAS: Millions of mothers and grandmothers recognize that the ultimate parenting issue is a secure future for all children; and

WHEREAS: Mother's Day was intended by its originator, Julia Ward Howe in 1872, as a time when mothers could come together to speak out against war and to work for peace; and

WHEREAS: The people of the United States entrusted to Congress and the President critical decisions about how to allocate funds to promote a peaceful world that is free from hunger, illiteracy, homelessness, and environmental degradation; and

WHEREAS: The arms race affects the quality of life for children and families by redirecting national resources away from education, health care, housing, and other family support services to weapons of mass destruction; and

WHEREAS: Nuclear war represents the greatest threat to the future of children worldwide; and

WHEREAS: The Women's Action for Nuclear Disarmament, Inc. (WAND) confronts this threat by educating women at a grassroots level about the need to eliminate weapons of mass destruction and to redirect military resources to human and environmental needs; and

WHEREAS: "Children Ask the World of Us" is a Mother's Day Family Celebration that WAND is sponsoring on May 12, 1991 at Michela's Restaurant to draw attention to our collective responsibility to ensure a safe and peaceful future for our children; now therefore be it

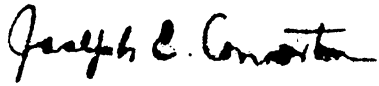
RESOLVED: That this City Council proclaims and commends Mother's Day, May 12, 1991 as "Mothers' Day for Peace"; and further be it
