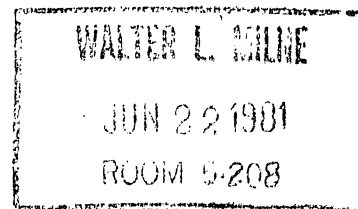

RE: Cambridgeport Industrial Development Plan

By a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors of our Association, we wish to be recorded as favoring the June 16, 1981, revised petition of the Planning Board to rezone the Cambridge Industrial District.

For too long, this extensive tract of property has remained in its present unsightly and unproductive state. It has cost the City of Cambridge a tremendous amount of lost income in taxes, has not pleased the neighbors, and has probably not been satisfactory to MIT.

We also recognize that there is not 100% agreement on every single aspect of the petition, but, by and large, it has received the support of most of the parties involved. We believe that further delay would be detrimental to the best interests of the City and we strongly urge you to approve said petition.

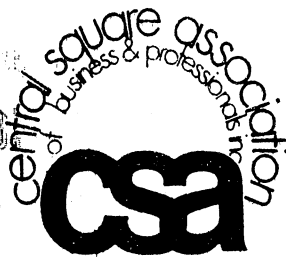

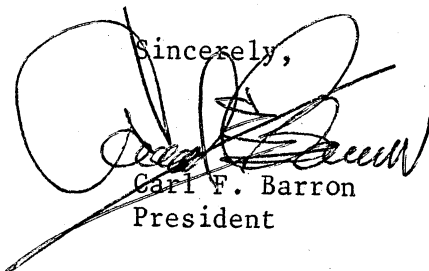
