WHEREAS: The Council on Aging is working hard to restore the money lost over the past several years in their budget from the state; and

WHEREAS: The State has reduced its allocation from \$2.30 per senior citizen to \$1.70 per senior citizen, which caused the Council on Aging to lose its volunteer coordinator two years ago; and

WHEREAS: The Massachusetts Association for Councils on Aging and Senior Center Directors is now launching a campaign to restore the \$2.30 per elder in order to keep local services at the needed level for senior programs, as well as supporting a competitive grant program to fund specific programs in state-wide training; now therefore be it

ORDERED: That the City Clerk be and is hereby requested to forward a copy of this resolution to our legislative body and notify them that this City Council is in favor of the \$2.30 per senior citizen grant as well as supportive of the Massachusetts Association for Councils on Aging and Senior Citizen Directors to reestablish competitive grant programs.
