REPORT OF THE PERAMBULATION OF THE BOUNDARY LINE
BETWEEN THE CITY OF CAMBRIDGE
AND THE TOWN OF BELMONT

CAMBRIDGE, MASS.

To the City Council of the City of Cambridge and the Selectmen of the Town of Belmont

Gentlemen:

The undersigned committee, duly appointed by the City Council of the City of Cambridge and the Selectmen of the Town of Belmont, to perambulate the boundary lines between said city and town, would respectfully report that they did on December 30, 1930 examine the boundary line dividing said city and town and that they found monuments as described below marked proper positions as described herein.

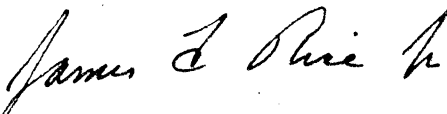
Beginning at a stone bound in the boundary line between the Town of Belmont, The Town of Watertown and the City of Cambridge, as established by an Act of the Legislature Chapter 181, and approved March 24, 1922, said bound being six inches below the surface of Belmont Street. This bound is situated about 1,100.0 feet from the junction of Belmont and Mt. Auburn Streets and is ten and fifteen hundredths (10.15) feet northerly from a stone witness monument situated on the southerly line of Belmont Street. Thence, almost due north three and twenty-six hundredths (3.26) feet to a stone numbered 10 (which is about one foot below the surface of the street.)

Thence, almost due north by the same line about two thousand and eighty-two and five tenths (2082.5) feet to a stone bound marked "B.C." (Bound 11) at the Town of Belmont Cemetery. Thence, turning and following the line of the cemetery fence in a south-easterly direction three-hundred fifty seven and one half feet to a stone bound marked "B.C. " (Bound 10) with a witness bound twelve feet westerly away from the true corner (neither of which were found.) Thence turning and still running along the Cemetery wall in a northeasterly direction forty-four-feet to a stone bound marked "B. C." (Bound 9) thence, turning and running along the cemetery wall in a nearly northerly direction two hundred thirty-two and four tenths (232.4) feet to a stone bound marked "B.C.: (Bound 8) with a cut in a stone boulder in the wall over the bound (neither of which were found). Thence, turning and running along the

cemetery wall in a northeasterly direction ninety nine (99.0) feet to an unmarked angle. (Bound 7) A reference bound has been set in the cemetery nine feet (9.0) away and in a westerly direction from the true corner (not found). Bounds in this area have been covered by recent construction. However, lot deeds do hold positions. Thence, turning and following the wall of the cemetery in a northerly direction one hundred sixty-four (164.0) feet to a marked "B.C." (Bound 6) at the northeasterly corner of said cemetery and Huron Avenue. Thence, turning and running in a northwesterly direction along the southwesterly line of Huron Avenue about five hundred and ninety-feet (590.0) to an unmarked stone bound set flush with the street surface (not found) (Bound 5) Thence, turning at right angle and running northeasterly forty-one and twenty-five one hundredths (41.25) feet across said Huron Avenue to a stone bound marked "B.C." (not found). Destroyed by construction, however, held by property corner. Thence, northerly along the easterly side of Grove Street, in Belmont (formerly Huron Avenue in Cambridge) one thousand seven hundred seventy-two and twenty-five one hundredths (1,772.25) feet to a point in the northerly line of Washington Street, at its intersection with Blanchard Road in Cambridge, said point being marked by a stone bound set flush with the street surface, (Bound 4) and being forty-two and seventy-five hundredths (42.75) feet easterly from the old stone bound marked "B.C." - thence, easterly along the northerly line of Blanchard Road 431.60 feet to a point of tangent; thence, continuing in an easterly and northerly direction along the westerly line of 320.0 foot radius 254.05 feet to a point of compound curve; thence, in a northerly direction along the westerly line of 560.0 foot radius, 226.83 feet to a point of curvature; thence, continuing in a northerly direction along the westerly line of Blanchard Road, distances respectively of 405.27 - 216.24 to a stone bound 30 southerly of Mannix Circle, thence, 248.72 to a point of tangent; thence continuing along a curved line of 300.0 foot Radius a distance of 125.69 feet to point of curvature; thence, continuing along the westerly line of Blanchard Road in a northerly direction to town bound called Bound #3, 198.03 feet at the southerly side of the former location of Concord Avenue and buried six inches (not found), thence, running in the same northerly direction along the westerly line of Blanchard Road one thousand three hundred and sixty-one and five tenths (1,361.5) feet to a stone bound in a manhole built in 1980. (Bound 2) Thence, turning and running in a northeasterly direction seven hundred twenty-four and five tenths (724.5) feet to a stone bound marked "B.C." at a point where the original location line of the Fitchburg Railroad crosses Wellington Brook. Thence, turning and running a

little more northerly two thousand two hundred and thirty-four (2,234.0) feet to a stone bound marked "A.B.C." on the old dividing line between Cambridge and Arlington which bound is about two thousand seven hundred eighty and twenty-seven hundredths (2780.27) feet (see Metropolitan Park Plan, No. A-240 showing correct location) as measured on said last dividing line from the witness bound. This location has been covered by Concord Turnpike Construction.

REPORT OF THE LOCATION OF THE BOUNDARY
MARKERS OF THE TOWN OF WATERTOWN
BETWEEN
CONTIGUOUS CITIES AND TOWNS

to the City Clerk and the Mayor of the City of Cambridge, Massachusetts:-
Gentlemen:

Pursuant to Chapter 42, Section 2 of the General Laws, as amended, the undersigned Selectmen of the Town of Watertown, located the boundary markers of the Town of Watertown, between the Town and the City of Cambridge, and hereby respectfully submits a copy of said record, and reports that it did on December 9, 1980 examine the boundary lines dividing said City and Town, and that they have found and located boundary markers of the Town, renewed the marks thereon and the year located marked upon the face thereof, as described below.

Beginning at a stone bound in the boundary line between the Town of Watertown and the City of Cambridge, as established by an Act of the Legislature, Chapter 181, and approved March 4, 1922, said bound being six inches below the surface of Belmont Street and three and twenty-six hundredths feet southerly from a stone monument numbered 10, and ten and fifteen hundredths feet northerly from a stone monument situated on the southerly line of Belmont Street; - thence easterly parallel to and ten feet distant northerly from the southerly line of Belmont Street and said line extended 1164.77 feet to a drill hole in the granite cap stone of the westerly abutment of the

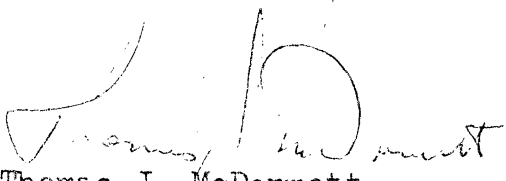
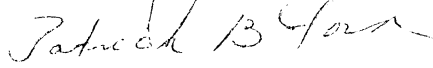
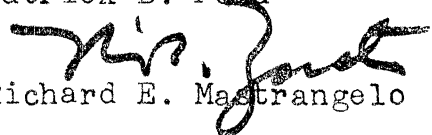
bridge over the Watertown Branch of the Fitchburg Railroad; - thence south-westerly in the general direction of the bridge abutment 89 feet to a bolt in the cap stone on the southerly side of Mt. Auburn Street and marked "C"; thence easterly along the said southerly line of Mt. Auburn Street (as laid out and established by the County Commissioners on the 13th day of June, 1896) to a point in the old southerly line of Mt. Auburn Street; - thence easterly along said southerly line of Mount Auburn Street to a stone marked "C.W. 7-1829"; thence easterly in a straight line to a stone marked "C.W. 6"; thence turning and running south $10^{\circ} 17'$ west 445.49 feet across land of Mt. Auburn Cemetery to a stone monument standing in said Mt. Auburn Cemetery and marked "C.W. 5"; - thence turning and running south $80^{\circ} 10'$ east 1978.75 feet to a stone marked "C.W. 4" standing on the westerly side of Coolidge Avenue; - thence turning and following the westerly side of said Coolidge Avenue, running in a general southerly direction to a stone monument marked "C.W. 3"; thence south $17^{\circ} 10'$ east 38.14 feet to a stone standing on the southerly side of Coolidge Avenue and marked "C.W. 2"; thence running south $18^{\circ} 30'$ east 227.8 feet to a point marked "C.W. 1"; thence in the same line to the division line between Cambridge and Boston at the center of Charles River. All lines to conform with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Harbor and Land Commission Atlas of the Boundaries of 1903.
