NOTICE TO STONE CUTTERS.

Proposals for Cutting Second-Hand Railroad Granite Paving Blocks.

Sealed proposals will be received at this office until Wednesday, August 10, at 12 o'clock noon, for cutting second-hand railroad granite paving blocks into street paving blocks of the following dimensions and specifications: Width, $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 inches; length, 6 to 8 inches; depth, $7\frac{1}{2}$ to 8 inches. All the edges to be sharp and straight, forming right angles at their intersections, both horizontally and vertically. The faces to be straight split and free from bunches or depressions. The blocks to be equal as regards finish, and to be cut in a manner satisfactory to the committee on roads and bridges and the superintendent of streets.

Proposals are also requested for cutting second quality blocks from the material above stated.

The above required stone to be cut to the best advantage for the city, and separate prices per 1000 to be given for cutting each of the qualities named. The contractor for the above will be required to furnish his own tools. (The city will sharpen them.)

The stone referred to may be seen at city lot on Norfolk street, opposite the city stables.

A bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in the sum of \$100, the same to be satisfactory to the committee on roads and bridges.

The right is reserved to reject any or all proposals received.

JAMES K. PROCTOR'S INSANITY.

Proceedings in His Commitment to Dan-
vers Found to be Regular—Suffering
From Senile Delusions.

Salem, July 29.—A Salem paper today
published a statement from the Malden
Hall in regard to James K. Proctor, who
formerly resided in Malden and latterly in
Salem. He is now at the insane asylum at
Danvers. The article charges that Mr.
Proctor is wrongfully and illegally confined
in that institution. He is about 75 years of
age, and the father of the late George K.
Proctor, who was shot in a mysterious man-
ner in July, 1882, in the cellar of his resi-
dence on Dodge street. He has also a son
Frank living in Salem and two daughters,
one of them Mrs. George A. Murray of Mal-
den and the other in Boston.

For several years the old gentleman has
been employed by his sons at the produce
exchange. Since the death of George K.
he has remained with Frank, doing chores
and errands about town. He was consid-
ered "queer" by most people in Salem.
About two years ago he inserted an adver-
tisement in a local paper for a wife, "not a
widow bedevilled or a maiden bewitched."
About two months ago his son, Mr. Frank
Proctor, applied for his commitment to the
asylum, and after an examination by the
physicians he was committed.

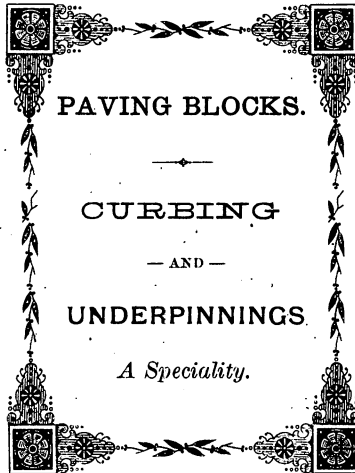

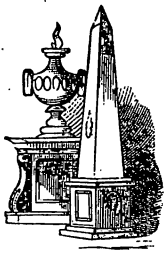
