James E. Ring, 52

Was Bank of Boston executive

James E. Ring, former vice president of international systems at the Bank of Boston, died Tuesday in Massachusetts General Hospital of lymphoma. He was 52 and lived in Boston.

Mr. Ring oversaw systems development for the bank's North and South American operations outside Boston. He retired in 1991.

He was born in Cambridge and graduated from Rindge High School. He was an honors graduate of Fordham University in the Bronx, N.Y.

He served eight years in the Air Force before joining Northeast Airlines. He later joined the First National Bank of Boston as a systems analyst.

In 1974, the bank transferred him to New York City as vice president of operations for the bank's commercial factoring division. There he worked briefly for Chase Manhattan Bank in the same capacity before returning to the Bank of Boston in 1985.

Mr. Ring leaves his parents, Richard and Frances (Hayes) Ring of Somerville; two sisters, Frances Christo and Carol Lynde, both of Medford; and five brothers, Dennis R. of Cambridge, Richard P. of Wakefield, Ronald J. of Holbrook, Michael J. of Andover and Patrick K. of Somerville.

A funeral Mass was said yesterday at St. Mary's of the Annunciation Church in Cambridge. Burial was in Cambridge Cemetery.
