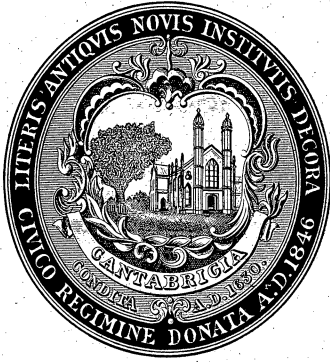

To the

Honorable the City Council of the
City of Cambridge:-

I have received an official communication from the Board of Health that said Board has abandoned its building on Reservoir street for further use as a hospital for contagious diseases, for the reason that the contagious cases can be more economically cared for in another way, and also that the building on Reservoir Street is in a dilapidated condition, and, to permit it to stand would be a cause of depreciation of value of property in this vicinity.

I therefore renew my recommendation contained in my Inaugural Address of April 6th, 1914: and that an order be adopted authorizing the Mayor to cause this building to be destroyed by burning; and further that an order be passed authorizing the Mayor to sell the land upon which the building is located at public auction to the highest bidder, the revenue received on this account to be used for hospital purposes.
