MWRA cites 63 companies as water regulation violators

Sixty-three companies in 32 Massachusetts cities and towns violated federal water treatment regulations during the first half of the year, the state agency charged with cleaning up Boston harbor announced yesterday.

In compliance with the US Environmental Protection Agency, the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority yesterday made public a list of industries that have not met one or more of eight criteria for discharging waste water. The violations include discharging more waste water than permits allow, release of pollutants and failure to report waste water dumping.

Richard Kanoff, MWRA director of toxic reduction and control, said the list is part of an effort to make waterways cleaner.

Many of the companies on the list have been notified by the MWRA, said Kanoff.
