and laid out as a public way.

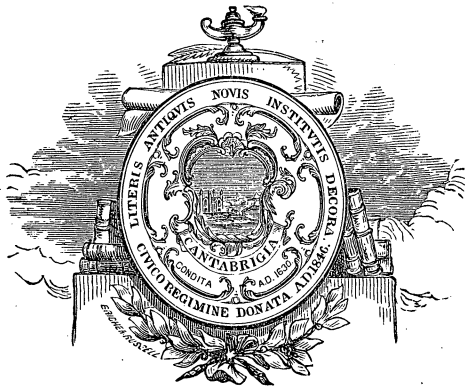
