This is a not for profit activity.

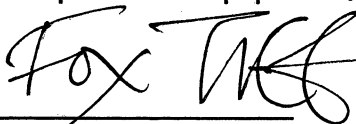

Perhaps located within an Indigenous People Memorial Park with Culture and Heritage Pavilions reflecting the history, heritages, and cultures of the 1,000 once free and independent Nations of Indigenous People on their Homelands in The Middle continent lands now called the Americas.

We look forward to establishing these Museums and the Indigenous Native Nations People Memorial Park in the area of Cambridge or Boston.
