- WHEREAS: This City Council was saddened upon learning of the death of Professor George Kistiakowsky, late resident of Cambridge and Harvard University Chemistry Professor for forty-one years; and
- WHEREAS: Professor Kistiakowsky was born in Kiev, Russia, attending private schools in both Kiev and Moscow and after fighting with the White Russian Army and spending a year in concentration camps in Turkey and the Balkans, he attended the University of Berlin in Germany and obtained his Ph.D.; and
- WHEREAS: Professor Kistiakowsky, noted for his brilliance in the sciences, was appointed Science Advisor to the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower and for his service to his country he was showered with awards; and
- WHEREAS: Through Professor Kistiakowsky's advice and guidance, President Eisenhower began to establish a program of arms control and world peace, a personal commitment for which the Professor never stopped working and in later years became increasingly concerned with the expanded military budget, to the point he once referred to the current increase in Pentagon spending as "this militarization of the country"; and
- WHEREAS: Professor Kistiakowsky's tireless efforts for nuclear arms control and disarmament over more than two decades, particularly in connection with the Council for a Liveable World, have earned him the respect, admiration and love of all who value world peace, especially the citizens of this, his adopted city; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council go on record extending its deep sympathy to Mrs. Kistiakowsky and the entire Kistiakowsky family; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to forward a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to Mrs. Kistiakowsky on behalf of the entire City Council.
