Editorial Questionable

The City Council's vote this week to deny the so-called anti-pornography referendum question a ballot spot for November was wrong-headed and should be reversed when the council meets again Monday.

Two years ago, a majority of councilors voted against placing the so-called Nuclear Free Cambridge question on the ballot, in spite of the fact that the election commission certified sufficient signatures to do so. The matter wound up in court and, of course, the city was ordered to put the referendum question before the voters who then voted it down.

Although the council majority this week argued that the anti-porn question, while non-binding, is clearly unconstitutional in its attempt to limit First Amendment rights, it is not the purview of a legislative body to determine constitutionality. That

job belongs to the courts, which will almost certainly declare the referendum unconstitutional, should the question pass in November. What is more important is that the council is once again attempting to think for the voters and to deny them their right to express their opinions through the ballot box.

That isn't to say that the anti-porn question is at all thoughtful or would be an effective way of limiting the arguable impact of pornography on modern society. The fact is that state law guarantees citizens the right to place a referendum question on the ballot no matter how ill-conceived the question may be. To be sure, the anti-pornography question is ill-conceived, but enough Cambridge citizens believe that it should be put before the city voters in November. And it isn't wrong for the council to attempt to block that legitimate process.

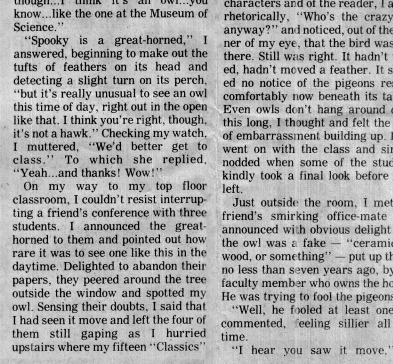
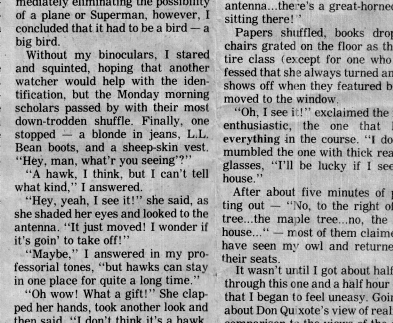
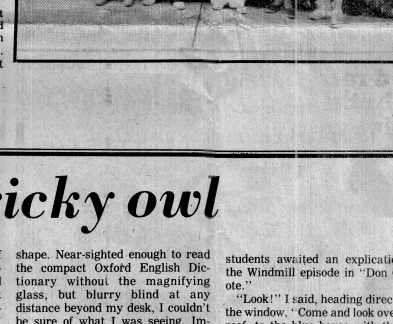

Resting birds, for example, as the shore flocks of tiny dunlins, phalaropes, sandpipers, and sandpeeps lift off in unison over the waves at my approach, I follow them frantically with my binoculars, hoping to match them up with the tell-tale "buffy underparts," "stouter bills," and significant streaks in my guide, but unless I can sneak up on them (and anyone who has tried to sneak up on a dunlin knows how hard that is), I'm forced to settle for the generic "shore-birds." Among these, I might be able to capture the greater and lesser yellowlegs for my life list, primarily because their yellow legs are long and bright, but they'd have to stand up straight, side-by-side so I could pick out the tall one.

I have the same problem with the common and arctic terns, both of which I observed for an entire morning at a nesting site on Machias Seal Island, off the coast of Maine. I knew that the common tern's bill is orange-red with a black tip and that the arctic's is red to the tip, but I could never remember which tip was black at the time. All the bills looked alike. Sometimes, all looked black-tipped uniformly like common or arctic terns.

Committee

comprised of the entire membership of the City Council

to which was referred the petition of Annlee Foster of 26 Essex Street and nine residents of Essex Street and Lamson Place to amend the Zoning Ordinances of the City of Cambridge, by rezoning six parcels of property in the area, as outlined below, met at 6:37 p.m. on October 2, 1985 in the City Council Chamber.

1. By rezoning from Residence B to Residence C-1 in the Essex Street and Norfolk Street area.
2. By rezoning from Business A to Residence C-1 on lot numbered 72 on Assessor's Plat numbered 90.
3. By rezoning from Residence B to Business A-1 an area on lot numbered 171 on Assessor's Plat numbered 90.
4. By rezoning from Business A to Business A-1 the area on Bishop Allen Drive and Essex Street.
5. By rezoning from Business B to Business A-1 the area on Bishop Allen Drive and Essex Street and Norfolk Street.
6. By rezoning from Business B to Business B-2 the area on Massachusetts Avenue on Essex Street;

all on Assessor's Plat numbered 90.

Councillor David Sullivan, Chairman, presided and called for the proponents to appear and be heard.

The Committee heard from Clifford A. Truesdell of 29 Essex Street who stated that the purpose of the proposed amendment was to protect the neighborhood and property rights of the residents in the area under consideration, that the petitioner had indicated their spirit of cooperation in the recent zoning involving the U. S. Trust Company and were disturbed over reports of 16-story skyscrapers and filed their petition prior to entering discussions with developers. He further requested that the petition be tabled or reported without recommendation to the City Council, in order to further the discussions and to work out a solution to the development in the area.

REPORT

Committee on

A second speaker stressed the need of proper height limitations for future development in the area and the present zoning which allowed 120 feet on Mass. Avenue which would impact Essex Street which was only 40 feet in width.

At 6:45 p.m., the Chair declared a recess and after a short interval, the hearing was resumed and the Committee heard from Ann Stewart of 21 Essex Street who recorded herself in favor and further requested that the petition remain in Committee.

No others appeared to be recorded at the call of the Chair, the case for the proponents was closed at 6:50 p.m. and the Chair called for the opponents to appear and be heard.

Shelly Miller of 121 Tremont Street, Brighton stated that a Mr. Shockett had owned the corner of Mass. Avenue and Essex Street for fifteen years as an investment, that the time was ripe for development, that the developers had met with the community regarding a building of 12 or 13 floors at the location.

In response to the request of the Chair to confer with the neighborhoods an affirmative response was received.

The Committee heard from Joseph Kellogg of Community Development, who stated that the Department had adopted no position at this time on the petition, that they would be conferring with Central Square Committees, that they had hired a planner to study the entire Central Square area and would make zoning recommendations to the Council when the study was completed.

At 7:52 p.m. Councillor Alice Wolf moved that the petition be tabled in the Committee pending further discussions of all concerned and the motion carried without objection.

The Committee was in receipt of a letter from Carl Barron of the Central Square Committee dated September 19, 1985, recording their opposition to the proposal, stressing the need for overall planning for the entire area, and objecting to "spot zoning" through a down zoning petition.

The Committee adjourned at 7:52 p.m.

RE: RE-ZONING PETITION BY FOSTER, ET AL (CORNER OF ESSEX AND MASS. AVENUE)

Gentlemen,

With reference to the above-noted petition to re-zone the area outlined in your Notice of Public Hearing, as bounded by Mass. Ave., Essex Street, Norfolk Street, and Bishop Allan Drive, please be advised that we wish to be recorded as being strongly opposed to any such change from the present zoning.

For many years, on both sides of Massachusetts Avenue, Central Square has been zoned for business. Those businessmen who have purchased property in the Square have done so, with the justified expectation that in an obvious commercial area they would be permitted certain rights of construction, and, accordingly, made their investments. These people are entitled to be protected, since investments usually represent dollars that have been earned by the labor and time expended in working to earn it, as in my own case.

Anyone who acquires a building, as a residential unit, adjacent to this type of zoning (which has previously existed for many years) should be fully aware of the fact that that is a risk they have taken at the time of acquisition of the property, and they should not expect that the adjacent business zone should be changed when they hear of new construction planned.

For some time, The Central Square Committee, consisting of representatives of the City of Cambridge, the neighborhoods, and the Business Association, have been working to develop and revitalize Central Square. A new Redevelopment Coordinator has been hired by the City of Cambridge to devote a great deal of time to the purpose of planning for the betterment of the entire Central Square area. "Spot Zoning", without taking in an overall picture is certainly not conducive to either good planning or the best interests of the entire area. This is another major reason for our request that you reject any further consideration of this petition to down zone this area.



Vietnam memorial to be unveiled

The Cambridge-Somerville Vietnam Memorial Committee will hold a ceremony to dedicate the new Cambridge-Somerville Vietnam Veterans Memorial on October 20.

The event will begin with a parade at 12 noon, which will get underway at Inman Square. The parade will proceed on Prospect Street to the Vietnam Memorial Bridge and the dedication ceremony will follow at 12:45 at the site of the memorial in Union Square, Somerville.

Scheduled to be on hand are Cambridge Mayor Frank Dunphy, Somerville Mayor Eugene Bruce, US House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., as well as veterans and military personnel.

The memorial will include the names of Cambridge and Somerville men who lost their lives in the Vietnam Conflict.

Families of all Cambridge men have been confirmed, but the veterans' group is still attempting to contact some of the families of

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Schools welcome new administrators

Three new administrators will assume new positions with the Cambridge Schools, today when school doors open for the 1985-1986 academic year.

Karen M. Prentice of Wellesley will assume the responsibilities of executive director of Occupational Education, Mary F. Zilonis, of Rochester will oversee elementary and high school media and library services, and Mildred C. Blackman of Cambridge will become the new principal of the Haggerty School.

Prentice moves to Cambridge from the position of assistant to the principal of Minuteman Regional Vocational School, a position she has held since 1979.
