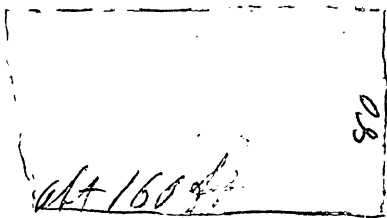

of Jacob Hittinger
May 13, 1863.

City of Cambridge.

In Board of Aldermen, May 27. 1863.

The Committee on Public Property to which was referred the Petition of Jacob Hittinger that the City would lease to him a small portion of the Gravel Farm in Belmont, has considered the same, and would respectfully Report:-

That the Committee can see no possible objection to granting the prayer of the Petition and would recommend that the Mayor be authorized in behalf of the City to execute a lease to Mr. Hittinger of a small parcel on the South Easterly corner of the Gravel Farm being a strip about 150 feet by ~~100~~ 80 feet, as shown by a sketch in the Plan of the Gravel Farm in the Office of the City Clerk: Said lease to be for the term of five years, at an annual rent of Fifteen Dollars.
