Anti-Defamation League honors 10 from Mass.

Awards given to youths for fighting bias

Dylan Larke came out last year, risking harassment and the loss of friends in her hometown of Marshfield.

"When I first came out at the end of my sophomore year, a few of my friends had less and less to do with me as time went on," she said. "This year I've been very isolated."

But Larke challenged homophob-

bia, founding Marshfield High School's first diversity club, now the Gay/Straight Alliance.

Larke is one of 10 state youths being awarded the Anti-Defamation League's World of Difference Institute annual awards for social activism against racism, anti-Semitism, homophobia, and other bigotry. Tomorrow at Brandeis University the recipients will receive a \$1,000 US Savings bond, \$250 cash, and the right to select a charity to receive a \$250 grant. Larke's choice for the

grant was the Human Rights Campaign Foundation.

Nine others will receive the Golden Youth Make a Difference awards.

Xochiquetzal Gonzalez, who is graduating from Milton Academy, started a group to support Native American issues. She said most racism results from what is taught in school. She chose the National Commission for Democracy in Mexico to receive a grant.

Grace Renee Coleman a senior at Brockton High School, works for the Brockton Area Helpline, linking people to services and resources. Coleman chairs Youths for a Better Brockton and participated in many community organizations. Coleman chose the Brockton Area Helpline to receive a grant.

Nicky Pessaroff, who is graduating from Peabody Memorial Veterans High School, helped organize an anti-hate group to fight racist graffiti in the school. Pessaroff's choice for the grant was the Holocaust Center of the North Shore.

Jeffrey Fong, a ninth grader at Braintree High School, fought racism against Asians, establishing a Cultural Club and becoming involved in the Coalition for Asian Pacific American Youth. Fong selected the coalition to receive a grant.

Lauren Arvidson, who is graduating from King Philip Regional High School in Wrentham, produced documentaries about the woman's suffrage movement and a minority woman's struggle in the workplace. Arvidson chose the Hos-

pice Federation of Massachusetts to receive a grant.

Heather Lynch, an eighth grader at the Atlantic Middle School in Quincy, participated in the Student Alliance Against Racism and Violence. She produced and filmed a series of skits which were shown in schools and on cable television. Lynch chose St. Chrysostom's Youth Group to receive a grant.

Veronica Marshall, who is graduating from Milton High School, founded the school's Students of African Descent group, which will mentor younger students. Marshall is involved in the YMCA of Boston's College Path Program, helping minority students access higher education opportunities. Marshall's choice for the grant was the College Path Program.

Max McMahon, a junior at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, helps homeless and impoverished people at the Boston Common and a Boston soup kitchen. This spring he organized a group of students to rebuild a church destroyed in the recent burnings of black churches. McMahon chose Ecclesia Ministries, which assists Boston's poor, to receive the grant.

Stephen Darrigo, an eighth grader at Bartlett Middle School in Lowell, is being honored for becoming the first male cheerleader at his school. He is involved in the Team Harmony Club, which promotes diversity in the school and community. Darrigo selected the Lowell Boys Club to receive a grant.

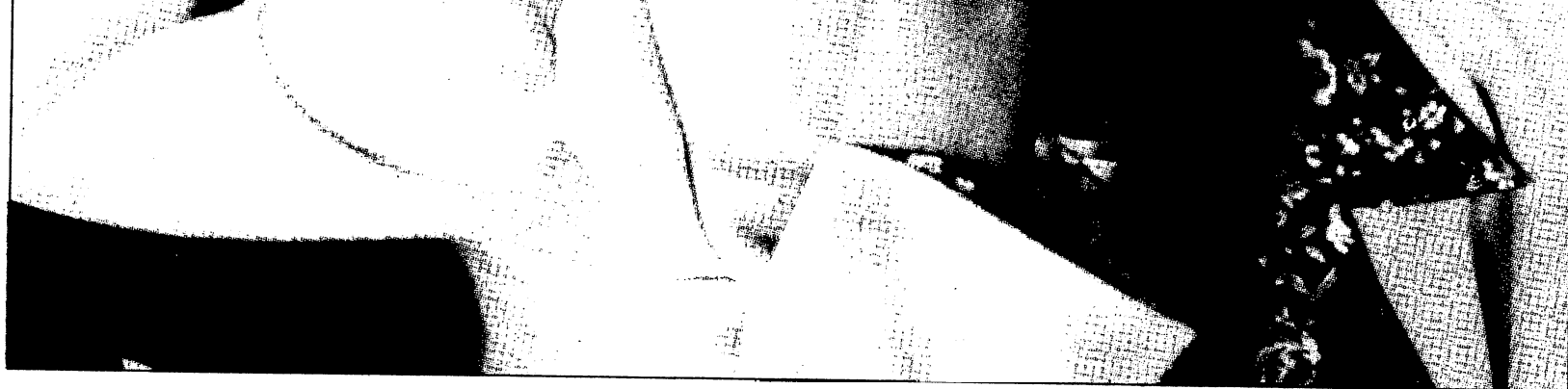

"I've been called arrogant," says Lisa Holmes, Boston's newest homicide detective. "I think it's assertive."

A chance to show her savvy

Growing up in the Orchard Park housing project, Lisa Holmes was a rebel who never had much use for cops.

But she left the project, bought a house, and joined the ranks of Boston's young and single professionals. Now she dresses like a bank executive, wearing silk suits, high heels, and a sculpted hairstyle that helped her land a part-time job as a model.

But it is her full-time job that is turning heads: Holmes is Boston's newest homicide detective and the first woman in the unit in more

than a decade. At 34, she has more than 13 years of experience as a Boston police officer.

Part of a new group of homicide detectives who have joined the department in the last two years, Holmes is among those who were chosen because of their street savvy, and for knowing certain sections of this city as well as they know the house they grew up in.

And she's a woman at a time when Boston police officials acknowledge they are overdue for a woman in the 20-member elite corps re-

sponsible for tracking down killers.

For years, women haven't applied for the job, and Police Commissioner Paul Evans acknowledged that part of the problem might have been the notion that homicide was a place reserved for men.

"That might have been the perception," Evans said. "Part of the problem, I think, is that it's such a tight-knit group. They work so closely together that they might appear insular."

Nobody, including the commissioner, believes that Holmes will be a good homicide detective simply because she is a woman. They believe she will be a good homicide detective because she was a good patrol officer, and later
