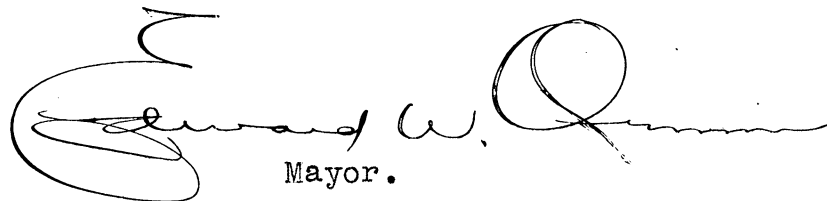
The Honorable, the City Council:

Mr. Lynch had served faithfully as a member of the Common Council in Cambridge during the years 1912 and 1913, and was President the latter year. He also served the citizens of Cambridge as a member of the State Legislature during the years 1914 to 1917. In all of his public service he was faithful in the interest of his fellow citizens.

WHEREAS:

A communication has been received from His Honor the Mayor notifying this body of the death of John H. Lynch, it is fitting and proper that we join in our tribute of respect to his memory.

Mr. Lynch was born in Cambridge and resided here during his entire lifetime. He early entered into the political life of the city and was elected to the Common Council in 1912 and 1913, serving as president during the latter year. From 1914 to 1917 he was a representative to the General Court serving with honor and distinction. After completing his term of office in 1917 he engaged in business and up to the time of his death was actively engaged therein. His public service was always of the highest order and he gave willingly of his time and talents both at City Hall and on Beacon Hill. Loyalty to his friends and to the city was ever his watchword and his untimely passing away will cause sorrow to the thousands who knew him. It is therefore
