To His Honor the Mayor.
Sir,

The penalty for offences under the 12th ordinance, is not to exceed twenty dollars, which is quite high enough, because we never reach that sum. One of the most careful sections of that ordinance, is the smith, and as far as my experience goes, we do not, for any offence exceed the sum of three dollars. I would respectfully suggest, that section smith, may be so far amended, as to make the minimum fine not less than five dollars no more than twenty, or it may be.
