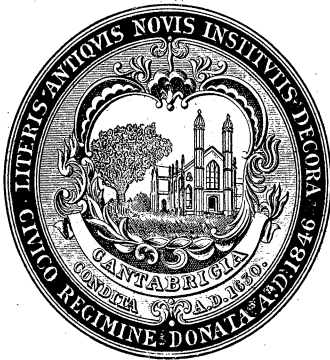

Honorable the City Council of the
City of Cambridge:-

I return herewith without my approval two ordinances "establishing salaries of members of the Police Department", passed by the City Council at its meeting on May 22nd, 1917. I am advised by the City Solicitor that the power of the City Council to act in relation to salaries is confined exclusively to the salaries of heads of departments or members of Boards. The City Council's authority to act in relation to salaries is contained in section 5 of part 1 of our City Charter, which reads in part as follows:

"The Mayor and the City Council or other legislative body may increase, reduce, establish or abolish salaries of heads of departments or members of Boards."

I am in entire sympathy with the City Council in its belief that the salaries of the policemen and firemen should be increased in order that these city employees should be able to meet the advanced expenses that they must necessarily incur because of the present high cost of living. Private employers generally have recognized or are recognizing that advance prices in the necessities of life demand increases in wages. The city is in no different position than a private employer, except that it must act more cautiously and with greater certainty as to the wisdom of

its decisions.

Since it is illegal to provide by ordinance such increase of salaries to our policemen and firemen, I shall ~~recommen~~ **later forward to you** ~~with~~ a recommendation for an appropriation sufficient to provide for this increase, to take effect as of July 1st, 1917.

It is impossible to provide at this time for increases or advancements beyond the present fiscal year because no Mayor may recommend nor City Council appropriate beyond the fiscal year within which it is acting. Your schedule of annual advancements in salary may well be taken as a basis for future recommendations.
