- WHEREAS: The sandstone and granite patterns of the neo-Romanesque building at 1555 Massachusetts Avenue have graced the north-east corner of Cambridge Common for one hundred years; and
- WHEREAS: The building designed by A.P. Cutting has for one hundred years given "the people called Methodist" a place to worship in Harvard Square; and
- WHEREAS: The building built for the students of Cambridge has been used by them for one hundred years; and
- WHEREAS: The building has for more than a quarter of a century served the City of Cambridge with the longest running film series in greater Boston; and
- WHEREAS: The building was in part a gift to the City of Cambridge from Frederick Rindge, a Methodist living in California who gave his native city its public library, its city hall, a high school, and this particular church; now therefore be it
