In the year One Thousand Eight-Hundred
and Sixty-four.

An Ordinance

in relation to the Sale of junk, old metals,
and second-hand articles.

As it is ordained by the City Council of the City
of Cambridge, as follows:-

Sec. 1. Licenses may be granted, according to
law, to any persons to be keepers of shops for
the purchase, sale, or barter of junk, old metals,
or any second-hand articles, and to be dealers
therein; which licenses shall contain the
following conditions and restrictions:-

First. That every person, at the time of re-
ceiving said license, shall pay therefor the
sum of ten dollars.

Second. That every keeper of such shop
shall keep a book in which shall be written,
at the time of every purchase, a description of
the article or articles purchased, the name and
residence of the person from whom, and the
day and hour when, such purchase was made,
and that such book shall at all times be

open to the inspection of the clerks and Aldermen, or of any person by them authorized.

Third, That every keeper of such shop shall put in some suitable place a sign designating that he is licensed as such, and containing his name.

Fourth, That the said shops shall not be kept open except at such hours as shall be specially allowed by the terms of the license, and that no purchase of any of the articles aforesaid shall be made by the keeper thereof, or by any person for them, except during such hours as shall be designated in the license:

And that said shops shall at all times be open to the inspection of the clerks and Aldermen, or of any person by them authorized.

Fifth, That no keeper of such shop shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase, or receive by way of barter or exchange, any of the articles aforesaid, of any minor or apprentice, knowing or having reason to believe him to be such.

Sec. 2. Any person having obtained a license under the provisions of this ordinance, who shall violate any of the conditions thereof, shall, upon the conviction thereof, pay a fine of not less than one nor more than fifty dollars,

for each offence, to be recovered by complaint
before the Justice of the Police Court.
