- WHEREAS: The Cambridge Pop Warner Warrior B Team consisting of thirty-eight players and cheerleaders made history in the fall of 1997 by winning fifteen games in a row without any defeats, winning the New England Regional Championships, being the first Cambridge team in history to be invited to the Pop Warner Superbowl in Orlando, Florida and being ranked the number fourth B team in the country; and
- WHEREAS: The season began when the team showed its determination and heart by beating Malden 7-0 despite an injury to their star quarterback; and
- WHEREAS: After pulling together in their first game the team rolled through the remaining eight games going undefeated and winning the Greater Boston League Championship; and
- WHEREAS: The team then took to the road and demonstrated to surrounding communities exactly what team work and determination are all about by beating East Lynn, Chelsea, Waltham, Everett and in a great come back victory beating Billerica after coming back from a score of 6-0 and winning 24-6; and
- WHEREAS: The City made the State of Massachusetts proud when the team went on to beat Merrimack, New Hampshire handily 38-12 and winning the New England Regional Championship for the first time in Cambridge's history; and
- WHEREAS: Following this game this B team became the "darlings" of mass media gaining more media attention than most major sporting events including the World's Series and the Superbowl; and
- WHEREAS: The entire state got to know this team personally and got to know how their sense of hard work and team work got them on the road to Orlando; and

These kids are the real thing



THIS IS NOT ABOUT LOUISE Woodward, Janet Reno, politics, tolls on the turnpike, or any of these other ridiculous items that have no bearing whatsoever on the way normal people lead their daily lives. Instead, this is about champions.

Today's champions are from Cambridge – the real Cambridge as opposed to the phony-baloney, hypocritical, condescending, elitist, arrogant, know-it-all Cambridge. These champions are public school seventh-graders – girls as well as boys from all across the town – who are part of a Pop Warner football team called the Cambridge Warriors.

Sunday, at Bentley College in Waltham, the Warriors played a team from Merrimack, N.H., for the New England regional Pop Warner title. The local lads won, 38-12.

As a result of their great victory, they qualified for the national Pop Warner Super Bowl tournament with seven other clubs from throughout the United States. Kickoff is scheduled for Dec. 9 in Orlando, at Disney World.

The Warriors arrived at the threshold of the Super Bowl by going undefeated – 9 and 0 – in the Greater Boston league. Then, they beat East Lynn in the first round of the state finals.

They beat Chelsea. They beat Waltham and Everett, too.

They played Sunday mornings, on a field in North Cambridge with more rocks than grass. To get to the games, some players took a bus or the T, all dressed up and set to go right there on the Red Line.

They played for pride, same way they practiced, same way they attend school. The Warriors are a wonderful snapshot of any decent urban future: 30 boys and 7 cheerleaders; one-third white, one-third black, another third a combo-platter of Haitian, Portuguese, and Hispanic, and when they tumble together in pursuit of their constant objective of getting to play another Sunday, there is no color, no barriers, no chip on the shoulder, affirmative action, "you owe me," "my dad makes more than your dad" kind of feeling: just the dual goals of winning and having a little fun.

After defeating Everett, they beat Billerica for the state title. That got them to Bentley and their big win Sunday, which resulted in the New England regional championship.

Check them out as they run through the goalposts, a team to make you proud: Timmy Dunphy, John McManus, Duane Tynes, Judd Bornheimer, Michael Alant-McKinley, Carl D'Haiti, Joe Simon, Brandon Harris, Sayma Burnette, Andre Scott, Tim Harding, Floyd Ferjuste, Francis Clifford, Ken Cooper, Max Meneus, Kendrick Jones, Junior Morpheau, Paul Remeika, Jermaine Hollins, Jermaine Anderson, Jakaiser Smith, Jarad Saunders, Craig Pearson, Marques McLean, Nick Marshall, Ryan McElroy, Sean Tierney, Peter Dunn, Jerry Paul, and Eric Mitchell.

And here are the cheerleaders: Lea Skidmore, Deborah Keene, Talisha Jones, Jessica Dottin, Ladawanna Sparks, and the Henry sisters, twins named Narissa and Neressa. How cool is that?

Dennis Dottin, a Cambridge hospital worker, and Eric Ritter, a Boston schoolteacher, along with Ron Moody, are the coaches. Gail Holcombe and Judith Keene help with the cheers.

Now, let's cut to the chase: This is a team from, as pointed out above, the real Cambridge. Not some suburban club where kids simply expect to get the best equipment, the most expensive shoes, and trophies for winning exactly nothing.

In terms of wealth – actual family income – the Warriors don't exactly lead the league. And they need to raise enough cash by Saturday in order to fly to Disney World, pay for their rooms, and have enough left over to eat before playing their first game next Tuesday.

Joe Braga is president of Cambridge Pop Warner. Along with help from a city councilor and the Cambridge city manager, he has already raised enough to get the team to Logan Airport, but they are having difficulty coming up with the rest of the cash because it's tough to have to depend on a pack of kids with tin cans in their hand to pay the bill.

Think about it: This is a society where huge sums have been raised to pay Louise Woodward's living expenses. Yet, here we have a whole championship season, along with an entire team of marvelous kids from hard-working families, all clinging to a dream bigger than the boldest description imaginable as they dial desperately for dollars while praying that the clock doesn't run out on their fabulous chance to fly to Florida and participate in the Super Bowl of their lives.

to prison as they had argued is necessary to keep the 19-year-old Briton in Massachusetts while appeals are argued.

"We believe it indicates their willingness to make the inquiry we asked, whether there was in fact an arbitrary and capricious action by the trial court," said Coakley, speaking with reporters in the plaza outside Suffolk County courthouse.

In October, a Middlesex Superior Court jury convicted Woodward of second-degree murder in Eappen's death. The baby, who had severe head injuries, died Feb. 9.

But Woodward has been free since Nov. 10, when Judge Hiller B. Zobel reduced the jury verdict to involuntary manslaughter and released her with 279 days served. The prosecution contends Zobel exceeded his authority.

Yesterday, Woodward sought to counter the prosecution's arguments that she is a flight risk by attending the SJC hearing. She sat beside Silverglate and directly before Abrams, in a chair usually used by lawyers arguing before the court.

Woodward was also given extraordinary security. She was allowed to enter and leave the courthouse in ways that allowed her to avoid more than 50 reporters and sound and camera crews from the United States and England.

Like other convicted felons, Woodward entered the Suffolk Courthouse through the prisoner's door on Somerset Street. But she arrived and departed in a private luxury vehicle that was parked inside the courthouse for the 30 minutes she was in the building.

During the hearing, court officers, who typically are stationed inside the courtrooms, patrolled the hallways, while at least five State Police troopers were stationed outside on Somerset Street.

Woodward's attorneys said they will now explore whether to ask the court to allow Woodward to return to Elton, England, to spend Christmas with her family.

"We will have to consider what we will do," said Andrew H. Good, one of Woodward's attorneys. "We obviously would prefer to see that Louise have an opportunity to go home for the holidays" and guarantee her return to Boston.

"If the decision is made that [the visit] is not realistic," Silverglate said, "we will just have to live with it until March."

When he released Woodward last month, Zobel told her that any attempt to leave the state "would be regarded as a serious violation" and would have serious consequences.

He told Woodward her passport would not be returned to her, and that she was prohibited from applying for another passport pending a further court order.

But in their petition, the prosecution questioned whether the court has the authority to retain her passport because Woodward, under Zobel's ruling, has already completed
