A communication has been received from His Honor the Mayor notifying the City Council of the death of John F. Sullivan on July 10th, we desire to record the loss the city has sustained.

John F. Sullivan was a life-long resident of Cambridge and an important part of the industrial life of the city. Ginn and Co., publishers of school books, were fortunate indeed to have such a man as Mr. Sullivan at the helm. The Industrial Association numbered him as one of its most influential members and he did credit to himself and honor to the city as a member of the Board of Park Commissioners from 1917 to 1920. To the Cambridge Lodge of Elks he gave unsparingly of his time and talents and served as treasurer for a number of years.

The city has lost a public spirited and highly respected citizen in the death of John F. Sullivan. The youth of Cambridge could well emulate the example of his life and learn how, from humble beginnings, he rose by diligence and strict attention to business to a position of trust and influence and how, in all his years, he gained and held the respect of his fellow-workers and his employers. It was the innate nobility of his character that endeared him to all and his untimely death will be greatly felt throughout the city.
